## BUYING POSTAGE STAMPS FOR COLLECTION ON BET

Ex-Mayor of Fresno Makes Wager With Friend That He Can in One Year Corral an Aggregation as Big as Formers, Which Took Years

PASADENA, Calif., Feb. 12.—W. Park Lyon, former mayor of Fresno, is in Pasadena buying up postage stamps—not from Uncle Sam, but from any one else who has rare ones for sale. He has a list of \$1,000 with a friend, who is also a stamp collector, that he could gather 30,000 different kinds of stamps within a year. It took the friend years to gather that many.

Lyon has three months yet in which to complete his collection, and he has to get 8,000 more stamps. As the collection grows it is more difficult to find different stamps. During his collection Lyon has discovered many queer fakes, one being a "Prince of Redang." The "Prince" sells rare stamps of "Redang." There is no such country.

## BLAST MILLION TONS OF ROCK AT ONE FULMINATION

## PROHIB ANXIOUS TO HAVE CANDIDATE FOR PRESIDENT

Inquires to Find Out Whether Its Status Will Permit It to Have One, and Is Informed That It Is in Shape to Submit Man

SACRAMENTO, Feb. 12.—Prohibitionists want to put up a ticket at the May presidential primary, and National Committeeman of California Wiley Phillips, a Los Angeles man has written the secretary of state to ascertain the status of the Prohibition party.

It had been thought that the party was barred because it did not poll three per cent of the gubernatorial vote at the last general election.

Close reading of the primary election act shows that the law does not seek to cover presidential electors when speaking of the three per cent. As the people did not vote on candidates for delegates to the national convention, the presidential preference ticket may be exempt from the three per cent provision.

# Proposed Amendment to Charter Providing For Commission Form of Government for Klamath Falls

CONTINUED FROM SATURDAY

(d)—Purchasing Agent; Duties of—The Commissioner of Department No. 2 shall procure all supplies ordered by the city council in such manner as it may direct. He shall also procure supplies for any commissioner upon his requisition therefor. Such requisition shall be in writing, shall state the quality, quantity and the kind of material required, whether urgency demands that order be made by wire, whether the supplies shall come by express or otherwise, and the probable cost thereof, in detail if known. In case of emergency, when the estimated cost exceeds Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00), such requisition shall have the endorsement of one other commissioner. If no emergency exists a requisition for supplies the estimated cost of which is above One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) shall first be approved by the council. Whenever he considers it practicable or advantageous the purchasing agent shall advertise for competitive proposals for any supplies in writing of a public newspaper, or by circular letter, or other means sent to competitive dealers. All such requisitions, correspondence and competitive bids received shall be kept on file in the office of said commissioner.

(e)—Certificate of Assessment—It shall be the duty of the Commissioner of Department No. 1 to procure as soon as available each year a certificate from the County assessor of the total amount of property assessed for taxation within the corporate limits of the city as shown by the assessment roll in the said Assessor's office.

(f)—Estimates of Annual Expenses—On or before the first Monday in October of each year, or on such date as shall be fixed by the council, the heads of the departments, offices, boards and commissions shall send to the Commissioner of Department No. 1 a careful estimate in writing of the amounts, specifying in detail the objects therefor, required for the business and proper conduct of their respective departments, offices, boards and commissions during the next fiscal year.

(g)—Annual City Estimate—On or before the third Monday in October of each year, or on such date as shall be fixed by the council, the Commissioner of Department No. 2 shall submit to the council an estimate of the probable expenditures of the city government for the ensuing fiscal year, stating the amount required to meet the interest and maturing bonds of the outstanding indebtedness of the city and the warrants of all departments of the municipal government in detail, and showing specifically the amount necessary to be provided for each fund and department; also an estimate of the amount of income from fines, licenses, water rents, and all other sources of revenue, exclusive of taxes upon property, and the probable amount required to be levied and raised by taxation to defray all expenses and liabilities of the city for the ensuing year.

Section 78.

Streets and Highways, Light, Water and Sewers, Parks, Cemeteries, Public Buildings and Grounds.

(a)—The Commissioner of Department No. 3 shall have charge of Department No. 3.

(b)—Street and Highway Improvements—Whenever any street, avenue or alley is to be paved, graded or macadamized, such work shall be done under the supervision of the Commissioner of Department No. 3, who shall procure the materials through the Commissioner of Department No. 2, and such work may be done by contract or by day labor as said Commissioner in his discretion may determine.

(c)—He shall furnish a good and sufficient bond for the faithful discharge of the duties of his department.

(d)—He shall appoint all such officers, assistants and skilled employes as may be necessary, and may secure the services and advice of hydraulic engineers, special council and other experts for such compensation as may be approved by the council. He shall preserve the water supply of the city from impairment and pollution, and secure at all times a supply of pure water adequate at all times for the growing needs of the city. He shall cause comparative investigations to be made of all available reservoir sites, and such water supply, and report thereon to the council with his recommendation. He shall prepare and submit to the council measures for storage and augmentation of the water supply, and cause adequate water measurements and tests to be made, and the record thereof to be preserved.

(e)—He shall keep such books of account as may be

necessary to make an annual and full detailed report of all the assets and liabilities, receipts and expenditures of his department, including cost of maintenance, extension and improvements; and, in the event the city should own its own water and lighting system, he shall annually estimate the difference in cost in the municipal and private ownership of such systems. He shall take charge of all construction work of said water and light system in the event that the city should purchase or acquire the same, and keep the same in good repair and working order at all times. He shall superintend all construction, repairing or extension of said systems the same as provided in sub-paragraph "b" hereof. The character of any extension to be undertaken and the magnitude shall be determined by the council.

(f)—He shall have charge and superintend the collection of all garbage and the disposal thereof, under ordinances, rules and regulations adopted by the city council, and he shall make reports at such times as may be required by the City Council, which said reports shall contain a succinct statement of his actions thereunder and recommendations for more economical disposal of garbage.

(g)—The cash balances of the city in the hands of the City Treasurer shall be kept on deposit in the banks of the city, without discrimination, in proportion to their capital stock, as far as possible. Nothing herein shall prevent the City Treasurer from temporarily having such funds otherwise deposited, provided that as soon as practicable he shall deposit or re-deposit the same as herein provided. Before making such deposit, however, said Treasurer shall require a good and sufficient bond from each bank.

(h)—He shall have general supervision of all parks, parking and shade trees of the city, and shall have full powers to manage, improve, maintain and beautify the same; he shall have charge of all public buildings, and shall see that they are kept in good repair, and when not otherwise employed, he shall as far as possible assist other commissioners in the execution of their duties.

(i)—He shall be the inspector of weights and measures. He shall take direct and active charge of the city's sewer system, both within and without the city, supervising and keeping the same in good working order, and shall at all times confer with the mayor

and health officer in reference to the same. He shall supervise all construction work pertaining to the sewer system under the procedure of sub-section "b" hereof. He shall be inspector of all sewer pipes and appurtenances thereto.

(j)—He shall have supervision of all streets, alleys, avenues, sidewalks, ditches and the waters flowing therethrough or thereon, public improvements, street paving, sidewalk construction and repairing, gutters and curbing. In the event the city shall own its own water system, he shall be ex-officio water commissioner, and shall take direct and active charge of the city's entire water system, both within and without the city, supervise and keep the same in good working order. He shall supervise all construction or extension work, shall be the inspector of all water pipes, fixtures, fountains, fire plugs, connections and all other water apparatus through which the city water may flow, and see that the same is kept in good repair, and shall hear and determine all complaints and grievances arising under said system wherein the same will not conflict with any other commissioner.

(k)—He shall pay all city warrants drawn against him as City Treasurer, as in this charter provided, out of the balance of said funds against which said warrant is drawn, and shall charge said warrant against such balance.

Section 79.

Office Hours—It shall be the duty of each commissioner to maintain regular office hours at the city hall, and he shall give his whole time and attention to and engage in the actual work of the affairs of the city during such office hours.

At all times when not engaged in office work he shall take active management and control as foreman and director of the affairs of his department, and shall be responsible for the full and complete discharge of all the duties pertaining thereto.

Section 80.

Hours and Wages—Eight hours shall constitute a day's work in all city employment, and the minimum rate of wages shall be Two Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$2.50) per day for all day laborers.

Clerical and ministerial employes shall receive such salaries as may be provided by ordinance.
