FINED FOR COLD CARS, COMPANY TRIES TO DODGE

Insufficient Heating on Chicago Trolley Vehicles Leads to Court Assessing Penalties Totalling \$1,500, Which is Going Some

CHICAGO, Feb. 13.—Fines amounting to \$1,500 were imposed on the street railway companies by Judge Blake for insufficient heating on the street cars. In four cases against the Chicago City Railway company fines amounting to \$800 were imposed.

The Chicago City Railway company was fined \$700 on three cases. A motion to vacate the judgment and set aside the fines was made by attorneys representing the defending companies, arguments on this being set for February 17th. A large number of cases against the street car companies have not been brought to trial. These will be heard before Judge Blake during the balance of the month.

PINE MEN FIGHT CONCRETE AND OTHER SUBSTITUTES

Will Join National Lumber Manufacturers' Association in War on Artificial Building Materials Save in City Residence Districts

SPOKANE, Feb. 13.—The Western Pine Manufacturers' Association in annual session here decided to affiliate with the National Lumber Manufacturers' Association in an international campaign against substitutes for wood, namely, concrete, steel, brick, stone and artificial materials now being used in place of timber for building purposes. The campaign is to be carried on in rural communities especially, where it is claimed the substitutes for wood have no legitimate market. No effort will be made to curtail the use of concrete and steel in cities except in the residence districts.

SUMMER LAKE NOT LEASED YET TO THOSE AFTER SALT

Proposition Made to State by Projectors of Plan, Who Expect to Extract at Least 100,000 Tons of Chloride of Sodium Per Year

SALEM, Feb. 13.—Summer and Albert lakes, in Lake county, may be leased by the state land board to C. M. Sain and associates for a term of forty years, the lessees to engage in taking salt from the waters of the lakes and pay a royalty to the state.

The proposition submitted by Mr. Sain is that the lessees shall produce at least 100,000 tons of salt per annum, and shall pay the state a royalty of 10 per cent. They guarantee that this 10 per cent shall amount to not less than 50 cents a ton of common table salt, and not less than \$1 a ton on all other salt. The production of salt is to begin by the first of next year. The lessees agree to put up a surety bond of \$50,000. Mr. Sain's associates are Ellis Mallory and W. G. Young of Los Angeles and John T. Reid of Lovelock, Nev.

Governor West said in Portland that Sain and associates would have to sign a contract drawn up by the state board, and that the \$50,000 surety bond would have to be wholly valid and satisfactory before accepted. The governor told Mr. Sain the two lakes could not be tied up for speculative purposes.

Proposed Amendment to Charter Providing For Commission Form of Government for Klamath Falls

CONTINUED FROM YESTERDAY'S HERALD

Section 81.

Department Employees—Each department shall be entitled to all such salaried employees as may be authorized by ordinance. The head of each department shall nominate all such employees, but their appointment shall be made by the City Council. Each commissioner shall have the power of selecting and employing the day laborers necessary for his department. Any and all such employees shall be subject to discharge by the commissioner at the head of that department at any time, except as otherwise provided by this charter. The City Council shall determine the number of employees in any department, and shall also have the power of discharging them, or any of them, or may require any of the employees in any department to perform duties in two or more departments, and make such rules and regulations as they may deem necessary or proper for the efficient and economical conduct of the business of the city. The salary or wages of any such employe shall cease immediately upon his discharge from such employment.

Section 82.

Publicity Records and Reports—Each of said Commissioners shall keep a record book in which shall be recorded a brief but comprehensive record of all department affairs under his charge as soon as performed, and shall quarterly render to the City Council a full report of all operations of the department, and annually, and oftener if required by the City Council, make a synopsis thereof for publication. All such record shall be kept open for public inspection. The council shall provide for the publication of the quarterly reports, or other reports, or portions of the annual report, as it may deem advisable. Each commissioner shall also make and keep a complete inventory of the supplies and materials of his department and a record of what disposition, if any, has been made of the same.

Section 83.

Other Powers and Duties—Said Commissioners shall have such other rights, powers and duties as may be provided by ordinance.

ARTICLE IX.

Section 84.

Municipal Court—A Municipal Court shall be and hereby is established for the City of Klamath Falls,

Oregon, the sitting judge of which shall have original and exclusive jurisdiction and the authority of a Justice of the Peace in both civil and criminal matters within the limits of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon. He shall have the same power and jurisdiction, and be subject to all the general laws of the state describing the duties and rights of a Justice of the Peace and mode of performing them, and in all actions, causes or suits he shall tax and collect the same fees, compensation, fines and penalties as are allowed to Justices of the Peace for like service, unless otherwise provided. All civil or criminal proceedings before the said judge or proceedings for the violation of any city ordinance are governed and regulated by the general laws of the state applicable to Justices of the Peace of Justices Court, in like or similar cases, but in a proceeding for a violation of a city ordinance the trial shall be without a jury, unless the defendant, on demanding a jury trial, shall deposit in the court a good and sufficient bond for the payment of the costs of the said case.

(a)—The said judge shall make out and report to the City Council on the first regular meeting of each month a statement of the business transacted by him during the preceding month, whether as Judge of the Municipal Court of Justice of the Peace, and amounts of money received and collected on account thereof, and all costs, fees, penalties or fines and expenses taxed against or received from any defendant in any proceeding before the said court shall be paid to the City Treasurer, who shall give him receipts therefor.

ARTICLE X.

Section 85.

Officers and Employees—The elective officers shall be the only officers of the city. All other persons in the service of the city or any commission or board thereof, are hereby declared to be employees, and subject to removal by the council at any time, at its pleasure, and without cause except as otherwise provided by this charter. The powers, duties and compensation of all salaried employees shall be fixed by ordinance.

Section 86.

City Attorney—The City Attorney shall be appointed by the council, and shall be the legal adviser of the mayor, council commissioners and departments, and shall conduct all cases in court wherein the city

shall be a party, plaintiff or defendant, or a party in interest; and shall perform such other duties as are required by ordinance.

Section 87.

Oath of Office—Every officer or salaried employe shall, before he enters upon the duties of his office, take, subscribe and file with the clerk an oath of affirmation to support the Constitution of the United States, the Constitution of the State of Oregon and the Charter and Ordinances of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, and faithfully perform the duties of the office or position upon which he is about to enter.

Section 88.

Bonds—Any officer or employe required to give bond shall not be qualified for his office or employment until such bond has been duly approved by the council, and filed with the clerk, who shall have custody thereof.

Section 89.

No Extra Compensation—No officer or employe shall solicit any pay, commission, money or thing of value, or derive any benefit, profit or advantage, directly or indirectly, from or by reason of any dealings with, or service for the city, by himself or by others, or from or by reason of any improvements, alterations or repairs required by authority of the city except his lawful compensation or such salary as such officer or employe. No officer or salaried employe of the city shall, except as otherwise provided by this charter, accept directly or indirectly, from any railroad, telegraph or telephone company, or from any owner of any public utility franchise in the city, any pass, frank, free ticket, free service or other service upon terms more favorable than those granted to the public generally. Any violation of this section shall be a misdemeanor.

Section 90.

Opinions Not to Affect Appointments—No appointment to any position under the city government shall be made or withheld by reason of any religious or political opinions, or affiliations, or political service, and no appointment or election to, or removal from, any office or employment, and no transfer, reduction, promotion, reward or punishment shall be in any manner affected or made by reason of such opinions, affiliations or service.

Section 91.

Official Books and Documents—(a)—All books,

records and papers of each office, department, board or commissioner, are city property, and must be kept as such by the proper official or employe during his continuance in office, and delivered to his successor, who shall give duplicate receipts therefor, one of which shall be filed with the City Clerk. The failure to so deliver such books, records and papers shall be a misdemeanor.

(b)—Certified copies or extracts from the books or records and files shall be given by the officer, board, commission or employe having the same in custody to any person demanding the same, and paying for such copy or extract; but the records of the police department shall not be subject to inspection or copy without the permission of the mayor; provided, however, that the financial records of the Police Department shall at all times be open to inspection.

(c)—All equipment, collections, models, construction tools and implements which are collected, maintained, used or kept by the city, or by any department, board or commission, shall be city property, and be turned over by the custodian thereof to his successor, or duly accounted for.

ARTICLE XI.

Franchises and Public Utilities

Section 92.

Ordinances Granting Franchises—No proposed ordinance granting any franchise to any public service, corporation or company shall be granted except upon the vote of the qualified electors of the city, and the question of its being granted shall be submitted to such vote upon the deposit with the Treasurer of the expense (the expense to be determined by the treasurer) of such submission by the applicant for said franchise, and no such franchise shall be granted unless a majority of such electors voting thereon shall vote in favor thereof. Said franchise shall be advertised in one daily paper for three days before being submitted to the people.

Section 93.

Contracts for Service—All contracts for service between the city and the owner or manager of any such franchise shall be made by ordinance, the terms of which shall be agreed to in writing by said owner or manager prior to the passage of such ordinance.
