

CHEMICAL SCHEDULE IS APPROVED BY DEMOCRATS

Ways Committee Men Accept Revision in Payne Law—New Bill Is Expected to Increase Revenue \$12,000,000 to \$16,000,000

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 13.—Democrats of the house ways and means committee have accepted the revision of the chemical schedule in the Payne law. The new bill is expected to increase the governmental revenue from \$12,000,000 to \$16,000,000 annually, the first tariff bill the democrats reported failing to reduce the revenue. It also departs from the democratic system of making all duties ad valorem.

WARANTS FOR UNION MEN ISSUED BY COMMISSIONER

President of Iron Workers' Organization, Among Those Wanted, Declares He Will Be Exonerated of Dynamiting by Trial

CHICAGO, Feb. 13.—Federal Commissioner Foote has issued warrants for President Ryan of the Iron Workers, and Secretary Houlhan of the Chicago local of the same union, and others, passed on in the Indianapolis indictments.

The Houlhan and Ryan indictments charge unlawful conspiracy for transportation of nitroglycerine on passenger trains engaged in interstate commerce.

"The federal folks will find me right here whenever they want me," said Ryan, on learning of the warrant issued at Chicago. "I am not afraid of the charges, and am confident that a trial will prove my innocence of any connection with the McNamara dynamiting."

WAR ON LIQUOR PLACES BRINGS IN MANY FINES

Ex-Councilman of Grants Pass Jailed Among Others -- About \$8,000 Worth of Joyful Liquids Seized by Officers to Be Poured Into Gutter

GRANTS PASS, Feb. 13.—A crusade against illegal liquor places in Grants Pass and charges against dealers in towns of the county, involving some nine men, has resulted in fines aggregating 1,650 and putting four residents in the county jail. This is dry territory.

In jail is a former city councilman who is the owner of a bottling works here, and two other dealers in Grants Pass and one from Kerby. This is in addition to heavy fines, two being assessed \$200 each, one \$300, and one \$500. All the others, except one country dealer, pleaded guilty. He went to trial in two cases before juries and was convicted in both.

Two places in the city were raided and wet goods including full barrels were seized. The total value of the seized goods is estimated by the prosecution attorney as \$3,000. It is stated by the prosecution that all this liquor will be emptied in the gutter.

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FRANCE DON'T INCREASE WITH GREAT RAPIDITY

In Population of Nearly 40,000,000 Increase for Five Years Past Has Been Less Than 350,000—In Forty Years Increase Has Been 3,500,000

PARIS, Feb. 13.—The results of last year's census in France have been officially published. They show that the population numbers but little over 39,500,000 persons, the increase for the previous five years being only 349,264.

In the past forty years the population has increased only 3,500,000.

The increase in the last quinquennial period is accounted for practically entirely by the growth in population of the Seine department. In sixty-four departments the population has actually declined. The figures indicate a continual migration from the rural districts to the large towns, especially to Paris, the population of which is returned at 2,888,110.

ONE CENT POSTAGE WANTED BY PEOPLE OF OREGON

Sentiment Not Unanimous on Parcel Post Question, However—Opposition to It Seems to Originate With Some Systematic Agency

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 13.—Oregon seems to be in favor of one cent postage if one may judge from the communications and resolutions favoring it that come to both Senator Chamberlain and Senator Bourne. Some of them say that as the profits of the department are made from the first class postage, that is where the reduction, if any, should be made.

While these expressions favorable to lower letter postage come in, others opposing the parcels post are received. The sentiment, however, is by no means unanimous on the latter subject.

Senator Bourne, who as chairman of the committee on postoffices, is conducting the hearings on parcels post, says that many petitions favoring a lower rate for parcels have been received, and that many of those opposing it bear evidence of having originated with some agency which is systematically securing protests against the measure. meantime, the hearings are going on, and the time

for the committee to make its report is still some distance in the future.
