NEW YORK, Feb. 14.—Mrs. Mary Golden dressed her two small children in their best clothes and sent them out with 5 cents each to buy candy, telling them not to hurry back, as she was "going to heaven."

The two tots were later found locked in each other's arms, fast asleep.

In front of the door of the Golden apartment. Nobody had responded to their continued calls to be let in. The mother was found lying dead on the kitchen floor, a tube connecting with the gas range in her mouth. She had been depressed because of ill health.

PLANS TINY EXHIBITION AS AMUSEMENT FEATURE

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 14.—Improvement of the Sacramento River in California, costing \$30,000,000, is urged by President Taft.
