COST OF \$12 TO PUT UP SMOKE CONDUIT DEFERRED BY CITIZENS AT THE RATE OF ONE DOLLAR PER HEAD

A short time since the chimney of the public library was found to be defective and was condemned, making it necessary to put up a new one at an expense of \$43. Although the income of the library is scarcely sufficient to meet running expenses and there were no funds on hand, the ladies, with their usual promptness, ordered the work done. The matter, coming to the attention of Mayor Fred C. Sanderson, he started a subscription list, and suggested that the ladies go out and ask the first 43 men they see for a dollar. The ladies began to have to call occasionally upon an indolent and generous public, but in emergency of this kind there is nothing else to do, until the library can be put on a business basis.
