SURVIVAL OF THE FITTEST.

THE announcement of the consoli-
 dation of the two morning
 papers which have been published in
 the Klamath Falls field is one which
 is fraught with considerable im-
 portance to the people of the city
 than many of them may imagine.
 While the sense which it is desired
 to point out is a benefit, it is not
 meant as a rejoicing at the down-
 fall of a contemporary and neighbor.

Very few towns of the size of
 Klamath Falls have, in the history
 of newspaperdom in this grandest of
 all countries been able to support
 more than one daily newspaper, much
 less three. For a city of 5,000 inhabi-
 tants to sustain a pair of journals
 diurnal for any length of time is go-
 ing not a little, nor merely some.
 It's proceeding with quite a gait.

The average citizen who knows
 that there are three dailies in his
 home municipality, when the place
 is the size of Klamath Falls, has no
 idea of what it means to the town,
 unless he is an advertiser. Asking
 the merchants to advertise in all is
 a good deal like expecting one man
 to support three families. The gen-
 eral scheme of things has not got it
 out that way, and while the man
 might accomplish the task for a time,
 in the end he is pretty sure to drop
 one part of his burden.

When there is only enough of a
 newspaper market to support one or
 two dailies by the advertising and
 subscriptions which make a paper's
 income, to ask advertisers to buy
 space in three makes a pull on them
 which is far from pleasant, and not
 at all reasonable. Happily the loyal
 business men of this city who have
 been friendly to the newspapers have
 met the situation with a kindly, gen-
 erous spirit, be it said to their great
 credit. The result has been that the
 trio of papers have continued their
 course, with more or less of an ef-
 fort on the part of their publishers,
 for a much longer period than it was
 first expected they would be able to.

The merchants are to be congrat-
 ulated on the difference which they
 will feel as a result of the change in
 the field. Their friendly hand has
 been extended to the three daily
 papers for a length of time which has
 been a test of loyalty that business
 men are seldom called on to endure.
 Their friendship and spirit of uplift
 has been shown to be not wanting.
 They held out until they were fully
 satisfied that the newspaper situa-
 tion here was overdone beyond a
 doubt.

The Herald wishes for the mer-
 chants the same success with but two
 newspapers in the field that three
 equally good ones could have brought
 them. It wishes for the readers the
 same competency of service that they
 might have under like circumstances.
 It welcomes to the field Mr. Sam-
 uel M. Evans, who, in it has, not the
 spirit of fraternal rivalry, but the
 same to have an article toward it if it
 were undertaken as a publication in a
 field in which it had not labored.

May the survival of the fittest
 in the dailies here be for their motto,
 "Pro bono publico."

ENGLISH INTEREST DEEP IN AMERICAN POLITICS

Pre-convention Campaign for Presi-
 dency Causes London Dailies to
 Print Special Dispatches Daily
 from United States Reporters.

LONDON, Feb. 19.—The British
 public is taking an unusually keen
 interest in the presidential situation
 in the United States. The papers are
 printing daily dispatches from their
 correspondents on the subject, many
 of them detailing at length the devel-
 opments of the pre-convention cam-
 paign.

Such papers as the Times, Tele-
 graph, Post and Standard also give
 the situation prominence in the edi-
 torial columns. The Times says it
 would seem as though Roosevelt is
 to be put in office if the efforts of
 the advanced wing are to count. Also
 it says that it does not look as
 though Roosevelt will refuse the nom-
 ination if it comes to him.

NEWSPAPER STRIKERS WIN VICTORY LONG SOUGHT

Members of One of Hungary's Lead-
 ing Journals, Demanding Raise
 Owing to High Cost of Living,
 Finally Get What They Wanted.

BUDAPEST, Feb. 19.—High-cost-
 of-living strikers, members of the
 "Pesti Naplo," one of Hungary's
 leading newspapers, have won their
 long-sought victory. When the owner
 refused a demand for a general
 20 per cent raise the entire editorial
 force walked out. Finally, the pro-
 prietor, who tried to get the paper
 out with the aid of friends, was com-
 pelled to surrender.
