Hates to Hurt Feelings of Fallen Dynasty and Deprecates Public Rejoicing Over His Election to Presidency of Republic.

LONDON, Feb. 20.—"Yuan Shi Kai today cut off his queue," says the correspondent of the Daily Mail at Peking. "He still, however, is unwilling to hurt the feelings of the Manchus and deprecates the public rejoicing over his election to the presidency of the republic," the dispatch says.

"The acting viceroy of the province of Chi Li has loaned Yuan \$3,125,000 for his present needs."

SILVER COINS DRIVEN OUT, MINING CONGRESS SAYS

Tendency by Bankers to Shun Metal Money Which Costs Them \$12 per \$1,000 When They Order It from Mints—Paper Comes Lower.

SPOKANE, Feb. 20.—Resolutions condemning the system through which it was declared silver coins are rapidly being driven out of circulation in the west, greatly injuring silver mining, were adopted by the Northwest Mining Congress. The resolutions declare that about \$12 is being paid by bankers at present for every \$1,000 in silver coins transported from the mints, that as a result paper money is given preference by bankers.

The congress suggested that new mints be established in the west, and that the Denver mint be reopened to silver coinage. It asks the national congress to give an appropriation for transporting silver coins from the mints to the banks.

A resolution asking that the laws be changed so as to permit mining claim holders to work out the annual assessments of \$100 on mining district roads, letting the work apply on the claims, and another asking for geological surveys in all mining districts, were unanimously adopted.
