STRAW BRAID INDUSTRY NOT HURT BY REBELLION

Chinese Revolution Has Not So Far Materially Decreased Work of Straw Gatherers or Braiders in China.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20.—The general fear that the Chinese revolution may have a depressing effect upon the strawbraid industry in China—and, consequently, upon the quantity of straw imported into this country for the making of straw hats—is not founded upon fact, according to a report just made by Consul J. C. McNally, at Tsingtau, China, to the state department.

McNally states that the straw hat industry in this country is in no danger of being hampered by lack of material because the activities of the revolutionists have not, so far, materially decreased the work of the straw gatherers or braiders in China and there appears to be little chance of interference with this work. As proof of this, the consul shows that the aggregate net value of strawbraid exports to the United States from Tsingtau during the December quarter, 1919, was \$209,746, while the value of the braid exported during the same quarter for 1911 was \$379,900. Tsingtau is the recognized strawbraid center of China and the leading export firms of the far east have large branches with experts in charge of the trade to American and European countries.

The straw is grown by the farmers of Shantung and the industry is one of great importance to the people of the province. The braid is made by peasants of both sexes and all ages and is exclusively a household industry. The better quality as shipped to the United States is plaited by girls of experience and ability, while the ordinary qualities are made by the aged and very young. During the summer months, when the men are employed in the fields cultivating the crop, every member of the household is engaged in plaiting the straw and it is frequently necessary to hire outside persons to assist in keeping ahead of the numerous orders for plaits. The wages of these persons vary from four to fifteen cents a day, only export platters receiving the larger price.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20.—Tveitmoe and Clancy were arrested today on Indianapolis indictments. Tveitmoe was released on \$5,000 and Clancy on \$10,000 bail. Mrs. Tveitmoe and Jafet Lindberg, an Alaska millionaire, qualified on both bonds. Both accused men filed notice that their extradition to Indianapolis would be resisted. The hearing will be before Federal Commissioner Kettell March 11.
