**COMMISSION GOVERNMENT IN  
 SPOKANE**

IF ONE were asked to name the  
 cities where commission govern-  
 ment had been tried with doubtful  
 success, Spokane would be in the list,  
 and, perhaps it would be mentioned  
 first. For a certainty the reports that  
 have been published with reference  
 to the operation of commission govern-  
 ment in Spokane have been far  
 from encouraging, and the impression  
 has been quite generally gained  
 around that the people there are not  
 at all satisfied with the experiment.

The Spokesman Review says that  
 the facts in Spokane do not justify  
 this impression. Speaking of the re-  
 call petition, which, in spirit, is an-  
 tagonistic to the commission form of  
 government, that paper makes the  
 statement that it is fathered by a  
 mere handful of men who think they  
 have suffered at the hands of the  
 present city officials; that these agi-  
 tators and protestants are not numer-  
 ous or influential; but in a way they  
 have managed to make a great deal  
 of noise, and the noise has gone  
 abroad. Continuing further upon the  
 subject, the Review says:

"It may be that the provisions of  
 the charter could be improved upon  
 by amendment. It is only natural  
 that experience should teach many  
 things. It may be that some of the  
 present commissioners could be im-  
 proved upon. That is a matter of per-  
 sonal opinion. But because it is neces-  
 sary in the handling of city affairs for  
 the officials to incur the enmity of a  
 few, is no reason why Spokane citi-  
 zens, as a whole, should be misrep-  
 resented.

Though we are not on the ground,  
 it is never difficult to designate the  
 class of citizens who are ready to de-  
 clare any reformed system of govern-  
 ment to be a failure, and thereupon  
 clamor for a return to the old system.  
 It is that class that is making the  
 noise in Spokane.

It was the same class that  
 made the noise in Baker. In every  
 one of the very few cities in the coun-  
 try from which we get the report that  
 commission government is a failure,  
 we find the same class behind the dis-  
 semination of that report.—Portland  
 Telegram.

 support he was, were in want. He  
 was sentenced to one year's imprison-  
 ment.

 under the ban.
