CHILDREN OF STRIKERS ARE MET BY THOUSANDS

Many Sympathizers With Textile Laborers Turn Out and March Down Aristocratic Street as an Escort to Nearly 100 Tots.

NEW YORK, Feb. 21.—With the words "A little child shall lead them," painted on a banner, several thousand sympathizers of the Lawrence, Mass., textile strikers, marched down aristocratic Fifth avenue escorting 92 children of strikers who had been sent here to be cared for in local homes, until the textile strike ends. The strikers' children were met by several thousand local socialists.

So great was the crush when the children emerged from the train sheds that it was necessary for the entire force of porters at the Grand Central station to aid 20 policemen in preventing the crowd from crushing the children.

FEATHRES ON TOES LATE WRINKLE OF FASHION

Stylish Femininity Will Be Allowed No Plunge on Bonnet This Year, But Can Make Duster of Her Footgear if Desired.

NEW YORK, Feb. 21.—The lady of fashion will shun plumage on her hat this year, but will be allowed to display a radiance of feathers on her shoes, according to advices from Paris.

CHICAGO, Feb. 21.—One of the most sensational robberies in years was perpetrated here when two robbers entered the East End Drygoods store on Clark street and locked the doors, shutting in 10 clerks and half a dozen customers. After pulling down the blinds they forced the customers and clerks into a small room in the basement.

Morris Samuel, proprietor, and his wife, together with Morris Rothenberg, the manager, were pushed into the vault in the office and the robbers took the day's receipts, \$500 which Samuel had been counting.
