WHY THE SECRECY?

THERE seems to be an effort on
 the part of the framers of the
 proposed new city charter to prevent
 an examination of said proposed char-
 ter by outsiders for as long a period
 as possible. It would seem that it
 would only be proper courtesy on the
 part of the council to present the
 newspapers of this city with a copy of
 the new measure, so that they would
 have ample time to acquaint them-
 selves with the facts in order that
 they might present the matter intel-
 ligently to the voters and reading
 public.

At the time the first copies were
 presented to the council, a request
 was made by this paper for an extra
 copy. The information was given
 that there were no extra copies. To
 give this charter the appearance of
 having been petitioned for by the
 people, a man was hired by the
 authority of the council to secure sign-
 atures to the petition. Signatures were
 secured to ten copies of the measure,
 and when filed the petitions were de-
 tached from the originals and all at-
 tached to one copy, and the remain-
 ing nine copies were withdrawn from
 the files.

Now this action is perfectly legal,
 but it does not tend to produce a feel-
 ing in the minds of the people of hon-
 esty or good faith on the part of the
 mayor, when a newspaper is refused
 a copy of the measure on the ground
 of there being no extra copies.

We do not believe that any mem-
 ber of the city council desires to de-
 prive the public of the privilege of a
 full consideration of the conditions
 and provisions of the new law which
 they are to be asked to vote for, but
 it cannot be denied that they are per-
 mitting the mayor and city attorney
 to influence them in an act which can
 not but create a feeling on the part
 of the people of this city of unfair treat-
 ment.

We are told that all of a sudden
 there has arisen such a strong neces-
 sity for a new charter, such as the
 mayor has drawn up, that it would be
 unsafe for the city to await the gen-
 eral election in May to act on the
 proposed measure, but that it is
 necessary to go to the extra expense
 of a special election less than two
 weeks before the regular election.
 Not having seen the measure, we do
 not know what this crying need may
 be, unless the proposed charter con-
 tains a provision for the increasing of
 the salary of the mayor, and he wants
 it adopted before the regular election
 so that he will be benefited if he
 should again be elected.

The petitioners for the commission
 form amendment, at their own ex-
 pense, had sufficient copies printed to
 furnish one to each member of the
 council, the mayor, the city attorney,
 the police judge, one for each news-
 paper, and several for the attorneys
 and any one particularly interested,
 and who might desire to make a care-
 ful examination before the measure
 was acted upon by the council. These
 people were honest and sincere in
 their efforts for the betterment of the
 city, and were not afraid of submit-
 ting their work to the people in suf-
 ficient time for careful consideration.
 Now these same people are paying for
 the expense of printing the mayor's
 charter, and it is not unreasonable in
 them to expect a certain amount of
 publicity and knowledge in what is
 being done.

This paper has never printed one
 word reflecting on the mayor or the
 city officials that was not true, and
 that we felt that the people were not
 entitled to know. We have no per-
 sonal animosity in the matter what-
 ever. If Mayor Sanderson performs
 any worthy act we are always ready
 and willing to give him full credit,
 but if, on the other hand, he does
 things which we believe is not for
 the best interests of the people of
 this city, we will not hesitate to so
 state. The public man who wishes
 to retain and is entitled to the con-
 fidence of the people, has nothing
 to be afraid of from public discus-
 sion of his acts.

HENDRICKS IS GUILTY OF SUBORNATION OF PERJURY

Supreme Court of United States Af-
 firms Conviction of Man Who Se-
 cured False Testimony in Oregon
 Land Frauds

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 22.—
 The supreme court of the United
 States has affirmed the conviction of
 Hamilton Hendricks, who was found
 guilty of subornation of perjury in
 connection with Oregon land frauds.

The case of Hamilton H. Hendricks
 attracted attention when it was tried
 the first time in 1906. It was stub-
 bornly fought by Hendricks clear to
 the court of last resort even after a
 final decision had been given by the
 United States circuit court of appeals.
 After losing in this court Hendricks
 appealed to the United States su-
 preme court on the ground that the in-
 dictment had not charged a crime.
 This was the only avenue of appeal
 left to him, since the circuit court of
 appeals is final as to facts. He must
 now serve thirteen months in the fed-
 eral prison on McNeil's Island, near
 Seattle.

Hendrick's offense consists of sub-
 ornation of perjury in connection with
 the acquisition of land through home-
 stead entries. He was represented by
 Judge Bennett of The Dalles, the
 seat of his operations.

PENITENTIARY PLACE FOR CORRUPT ARMS SERGEANT

Of Buckeye State Senate—Rodney
 Diegle Gets Three Years in Pen for
 Complicity in Legislative Briberies

COLUMBUS, Ohio, Feb. 22.—Rod-
 ney Diegle, former sergeant at arms
 in the state senate, must serve three
 years in the penitentiary for complicity
 in legislative briberies.

This was made certain when the
 state supreme court affirmed his con-
 viction, thereby holding valid the use
 of the dictagraph in securing evi-
 dence. This decision opens the way
 for trials of other members of the
 legislature, against whom Detective
 William J. Burns is said to have se-
 cured evidence through the use of the
 dictagraph.

Chief Surgeon of Golden Gate City's
 French Hospital is Recovering From
 Performance Unique in Annals of
 Surgery

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 22.—Dr.
 Bertram E. Alden, chief surgeon of
 the French hospital, is recovering
 from an operation unique in the his-
 tory of surgery, that of removing
 from his own body the verminous ap-
 pendix.

Dr. Alden infected a spinal anes-
 thetic, and with his own hand wielded
 the scalpel, making the incisions nec-
 essary for cutting out the troublesome
 sac, and gaining prompt relief from a
 severe attack of appendicitis.
