CONSPIRACY AGAINST WIFE OF RICH MAN IS ALLEGED

Attorney for Millionaire Claims That Effort to Let Housebreaker Out of Jail Is Plot to Wreck Character of Monied Man's Spouse

NEW YORK, Feb. 22.—Charging that the efforts to free from prison Folke E. Brandt, former valet to millionaire Mortimer Schiff, "is a conspiracy, a wicked tale, designed to reflect on the honor of a virtuous wife and mother," Delancey Nicoll, attorney for Schiff, declared in open court that he would prove his accusation to the world, and would drag into light a certain newspaper publisher who had used Brandt to strike at the millionaire.

At the hearing before United States Commissioner Hand, who was appointed by Governor Dix to investigate the Schiff-Brandt case, Nicoll said:

"We demand the broadest inquiry. We want every detail of the shameful story made part of the record to be submitted to the governor. I will drag it all into the light and show that Brandt said he was in the house on an invitation from Mrs. Schiff. I will show how the story was conceived, and also show those who aided him in publishing it. Schiff intends that the entire story be made public so that the responsibility may be shown."

Mirabeau L. Tows, who is representing Brandt, resented Nicoll's statements, declaring that rather than the woman should become involved, Brandt was willing to spend the remainder of his term in prison.

Detective Joseph Woolridge, who arrested Brandt, testified regarding the alleged manufactured record, on the strength of which Judge Rosalsky sentenced Brandt to thirty years imprisonment.

The case against Brandt was reopened when a detective who is alleged to have figured in a statement to send the valet to prison to save a woman member of the Schiff household, admitted that the confession signed by Brandt to robbery charges was a "frame up." The understanding was, according to the detective, that Brandt was to be given "a chunk of money" and sent out of the country.

Special Commissioner Hand ruled that Governor Dix must decide whether Schiff and his wife and Attorney Gans be allowed to testify, thus securing immunity. The hearing was adjourned pending the governor's decision.

DIAZ VIEWS MEXICO'S TROUBLES FROM ABROAD

Claims That President Madero Has Not Partitioned Haciendas Among People as They Expected Him to Do on Taking Office

TOULON, Feb. 22.—Porfirio Diaz, who is watching the revolt in Mexico with much interest, finds keen satisfaction in his belief that Francisco I. Madero, who succeeded him as president, and who drove him from power and "stole his hitherto uncontested popularity," is now paying dearly for his thirst for power.

The aged ex-president and his beautiful wife are living in seclusion at Cape Diaz. Long walks in the sunshine and the bracing air from the Mediterranean seem to have restored his health. When he received a representative of the United Press at his home Diaz was in excellent spirits, and did not attempt to conceal the satisfaction he derived from President Madero's troubles. He insisted, however, that his greatest desire was that peace should be speedily restored in Mexico.

According to Diaz the followers of Madero believed when they made him president that haciendas would be partitioned among them, and that they would soon enjoy an era of great prosperity. When they found Madero would not do this they became disgruntled and the present revolution resulted. If Madero attempted a dictatorship, Diaz said, both army and the people would forsake him.

"However," said Diaz "my peculiar position probably prevents me from forming a correct opinion. My dearest wish is that peace will be promptly restored. I have no desire to take a hand in Mexico's affairs. My reason for quitting the presidency when I had every facility for crushing my enemies was my desire for peace, and my unwillingness to oppose the national will."

"I am living contentedly here with my wife. I do not know that I shall ever return to my native land, for which I shall always have the greatest reverence and love. I will be greatly pleased if Mexico succeeds in shaking off the evils that beset her and is speedily restored to the state of peace and prosperity which her people should be able to enjoy."
