WE MUST PRODUCE MORE

THE movement to make the individual farmer his own demonstrator, increasing soil efficiency and reducing cost of production, a work suggesting tremendous possibilities, is taking concrete form as pressed forward by the National Soil Fertility League. A number of startling facts, supported by incontrovertible statistics, are arrayed by the league in contradiction of a popular argument that the farmer will benefit less by raising a bumper crop than a small yield, and equally significant is a review of the records of increasing volume annually of imports of food products that should be produced by American soil.

Distinguished individuals, leading civic and commercial organizations, all of the agricultural colleges and many of the principal news publications of the country, are co-operating in support of the measure prepared by the league and submitted for discussion and suggestion to all those interested, now pending in congress, as the Lever bill. A skilled farmer in every agricultural county in the United States maintained there by federal and state support equally divided, brings the farmer in intimate touch with the most advanced scientific and practical data. This is expected, judging from experience in Western Europe and some sections of this country, to greatly increase production, preserve the soil efficiency, reduce the cost of production and lower the general cost of living, at the same time to greatly increase the earnings of the farmer.

According to statistics, the constantly lessening acreage available for farm purposes does not permit maintaining a proportionate balance with the increase of population, the consumers are increasing in number and proportion over the producers, the concentration of population in cities will continue so long as current conditions obtain. Crops are increasing in volume and the returns to the producer advance in proportion, exports are lessening rapidly, and the imports to the United States of vegetables alone are enough to set the nation thinking. The demand for food will never lessen, the contrary being the natural law.

The United States government report for eleven years to the last census reveals the fallacy of the argument that an increase in crops means less proportion of profit to the farmer.

GENERAL SHEN'S HEAD REMOVED FOR CAUSE

He Bought Rifles for Army and Made Fat Profit on Them, and Shortly Thereafter Was Supposed to Be Ill Now Supposed to Be Dead

SHANGHAI, Feb. 23.—General Shen, who was made military commander of Shanghai when the republicans gained control, has disappeared mysteriously. Some time ago General Li Yuan Hung commissioned him to buy a quantity of rifles for the republican army at Wuchang. On their arrival there they were found to be such poor ones that General Li had them all thrown into the Yangtze. It was also reported that Shen bought them for 17 taels per rifle and turned them over to Li at 30 taels each.
 The day this report gained currency visitors at the general's yamen in the native city were informed that the general was ill but would be out again in a few days. Several weeks have now elapsed, and he isn't any better. Nobody can find him, either.
 The general impression is that the story of his illness is the polite Chinese way of saying that he has been capitulated.

TAFT'S REPLY TO TEDDY AT TOLEDO NEXT MONTH

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 23.—It is officially announced that Taft's reply to Roosevelt's Columbus speech will be delivered at Toledo March 8. Progressives privately admit that Governor Johnson is the progressive leaders' choice for Roosevelt's running mate. They expect Johnson to hold the La Follette ultra radicals in line. The governor speaks at Columbus next week. Progressives are confident that Roosevelt will on Monday definitely announce his candidacy.

LA FOLLETTE PETITIONS ARE TO BE CIRCULATED

Wisconsin Senator Wires That He is in Presidential Race, and Proposes to Stay There Until Sound of Last Trump Is Heard Abroad

PORTLAND, Feb. 23.—Work of securing signatures to petitions to place the name of Senator La Follette on the Oregon presidential primary ballot was resumed yesterday, following the receipt of a telegram from La Follette, in which he stated that he was in the race for the presidential nomination, and would be in the running to the finish at the national convention.
 When the news was flashed here recently that the Wisconsin senator was ill, and that his illness was serious enough to cause his retirement, work on the petitions was suspended, and a number of petitions that had been sent into Eastern Oregon on orders of Thomas McCusker, La Follette's Oregon campaign manager, were recalled.
