LIKENESS TO NAPOLEON NOT IMAGINED BY MAN

Chaloner, Suing to Recover Millions Withheld Because of His Mental-ity, Is Originator of Phrase, "Who's Loony Now?"

NEW YORK, Feb. 24.—Because a man thinks he resembles Napoleon is no reason to declare him insane, was the reasoning of John Armstrong Chaloner's attorneys here when the renamed son of the house of Chaloner began suit before United States Judge Holt to recover millions inherited from his Astor ancestors, and which have been withheld from him since he was declared insane by the New York courts.

Chaloner, whose original name was John Armstrong Chaloner, was prominently before the public years ago, when his brothers, former Lieutenant Governor Chaloner of New York and "Sheriff Bob" Chaloner, husband of Lina Cavalieri, had him declared insane. Chaloner fled from New York and has since been living in exile in Virginia. He came notably into public eye again when "Sheriff Bob" was reported to have signed over half his fortune to the singer. Chaloner then wired to Paris "Who's loony now?" and the expression became a classic slang.

Chaloner probably will come to New York under the protection of the court to tell, during the present suit, how he was declared insane.

When the suit was opened Attorney Ware, for Chaloner, introduced photographs to show his client's resemblance to Napoleon Bonaparte in the effort to show that his alleged hallucination on that subject was not a hallucination at all. He offered as evidence an affidavit of Princess Troubetzkoy, Chaloner's divorced wife, declaring him sane, but this the court refused to admit.

KIDNAPED GIRL HEIRESS TO THOUSANDS, IS STORY

Says Negro Woman Picked Her Up in Father's Yard in Rochester When She Was Little—Boy's Clothes Her Raiment

DENVER, Feb. 24.—Miss Elsie May Foster, who says she was kidnapped from her home when a few months old, and that she always supposed she was the daughter of the late Mrs. Hannah Foster, has learned that her real name is Inez Axelheimer, and that her father, who is reputed to be a millionaire, is living in Rochester, N. Y.

Miss Foster has enlisted the aid of her father and declares she will institute legal proceedings for possession of property left by Mrs. Foster, who died in April, 1904, leaving an estate of about \$100,000.

According to Miss Foster, it was not until shortly before the death of an old negro woman that she learned what she claims is her real identity.

"This negro woman, whose name was Ellen Monroe, picked me up in my father's yard in Rochester one day," said Miss Foster. "I was taken from the city, and as I was too young to remember the incident, I always thought Mrs. Foster was my mother."

Miss Foster said that for two or three years after she was taken from her father's home she wore boy's clothing, and that a dermatologist changed the shape of her nose so that she could not be recognized. She was educated in the Denver schools and in an Eastern convent.

LIGHT MOUNTAIN SNOWS MAY MEAN RAILROAD LOSS

Big Snowplows and Rotaries Idle, Although Huntington Axion Favors Spending Million for Right of Way Repairs Than Miss Snowfall

SACRAMENTO, Feb. 24.—For the first time in February in many years the Southern Pacific snow plows and giant rotaries are lying idle at Truckee and Summit in Placer county. This condition has been caused by the phenomenally light fall of snow in the mountains. It is an axiom among officials of the Southern Pacific, handed down by Collis P. Huntington that it is better to spend \$1,000,000 for repairs on the mountain division than to miss a seasonable snowfall.

Some alarm is expressed by farmers owing to the light snow and rain-fall. Plenty of snow means an abundance of water in the summer months and without a good supply of water for irrigation and navigation purposes crops are likely to suffer. An indication of the shortage of snow at Summit is shown in the report of 26 inches at that place now, against 218 at the same date a year ago.
