HOW ABOUT SAN FRANCISCO?

THE time is near at hand when
 Klamath county must decide and
 take action if it is to be properly
 represented at the great Panama-Pacific
 exposition to be held in San Francisco
 in 1915. The state of Oregon, and
 practically every individual county
 will have space at the big fair, and it
 would never do for Klamath county
 to neglect this opportunity. Several
 cars of progressive men from Portland
 and other parts of the state will go to
 San Francisco on March 14th to select
 grounds for Oregon's headquarters
 and exhibits.

Probably no county in the state is
 in a better position to secure greater
 results from the Panama exposition
 than is Klamath county. At the time
 of the fair there will be one, if not
 two, main lines of railroad running
 into San Francisco through Klamath
 county and Eastern Oregon, and un-
 doubtedly many stop overs and side
 trips will be taken by visitors from all
 parts of the United States. If Klamath
 county is to get its share of these
 possible investors and home-seekers, it
 will be necessary to make a proper
 showing at the fair.

Klamath county should have repre-
 sentatives in San Francisco on March
 14th to take part and assist in the
 selection of a site for the Oregon build-
 ing, and also some definite action
 should be taken at once to determine
 if Klamath county is to be represented
 in a proper manner at the great fair.
 If this is to be done it will be neces-
 sary to create a fund not less than
 \$10,000 to cover the necessary ex-
 pense of building, exhibits and litera-
 ture. We believe that this expense
 should be borne by the entire county
 and could be raised by annual ap-
 propriations by the county court. How-
 ever, this body would have no author-
 ity to set aside this money unless it
 was shown definitely that it was the
 wish of the voters and taxpayers of
 the county. The feeling of the people
 on this matter should be expressed
 either through the newspapers or to
 the county court directly, so that they
 would know how to be governed.
 There should be no unnecessary delay
 in settling this matter at once.

ORGANIZER OF COOKS IS PINCHED FOR LARCENY

SPOKANE, Wash., Feb. 27.—Albert
 Beck, international organizer of the
 Cooks and Waiters Union, was ar-
 rested here on a grand larceny charge on
 orders of Chief of Police White of
 San Francisco. He was locked up in

YAKIMA VALLEY SHEAR BEGINS, PROMISES WELL

Approximately 150,000 Ban-Haas Will
 Have Their Overcoats Shorn and
 the Total Yield Will Run Over a
 Million Pounds, Maybe

NORTH YAKIMA, Wash., Feb. 27.
 Approximately 150,000 sheep will
 be sheared in the Yakima Valley this
 year. Shearing has begun on small
 flocks. The wool crop is the earliest
 on record in the valley, and runs into a
 total of 1,000,000 or 1,250,000,000
 pounds. The sheep average about
 eight pounds to the fleece for range
 animals, and the income received from
 the wool is a big source of revenue.

Present indications are that the
 price will range high for this season
 as compared with last year, and it is
 just possible that the wool growers
 will get a half more for a fleece than
 they did last year.
