TEST THE PRESENT CHARTER

THERE is a great deal of differ-
 ence between an amendment and
 an entirely new charter. Some press-
 ing need or condition might necessi-
 tate an amendment to the charter of
 the city, but when it comes to the
 creation and adoption of an entirely
 new charter, if such a thing were pos-
 sible, we do not believe the people of
 this city are going to be satisfied with
 one man's idea, or with a "one-man
 charter." It is only right and natu-
 ral that the people will want to have
 something to say about making these
 laws which hereafter they are to be
 governed by.

Portland has had some of her best
 legal authorities and brightest men
 working on a charter for nearly a
 year, and it is not completed yet, but
 Klamath Falls has a city attorney
 who in two weeks' time is able to
 draw up a charter containing 110
 closely printed pages, and the peo-
 ple are asked to accept it as a perfect
 instrument. Is there evidence of the
 careful consideration necessary in an
 important measure of this kind?

One moment we are told that the
 old charter is illegal, and next mo-
 ment it is admitted that unless the
 present charter is legal the present
 city officials are not a legal body and
 could not present a new charter for
 adoption.

Would it not be a wise move to
 allay all doubt and suspicion as to
 the legal status of our city officials
 under the present charter before
 holding a special election for the sub-
 mission of a new charter? A new
 charter in itself, however ably drafted
 or carefully submitted as to details
 of the initiative, cannot cure the want
 of jurisdiction in the body whose
 duty it is to receive the petition, if
 initiated by petition, on in the officer
 whose duty it is to verify the sig-
 natures or in the council whose duty
 it is to ordain the measure.

If the present charter was illegally
 adopted, then the present council is
 an illegal body, without jurisdiction,
 and without authority to order a spe-
 cial election or give notice of the gen-
 eral city election, or legally register
 the voters of the city.

It would appear that good business
 would dictate the taking of immedi-
 ate steps to determine the legal sta-
 tus of the present city officials. There
 will be no peace or security until that
 point is determined by the courts. Let
 it be done at once. It certainly would
 be welcomed by a majority of our peo-
 ple in preference to the prospect of
 further entanglements through the
 attempted adoption of new legisla-
 tion without its determination.

POINDEXTER AND BERGER STRIKE PROBE MEASURES

Latter Is Expected to Provide Inves-
 tigation of Entire Trouble, Includ-
 ing Clubbing of Women and Pre-
 vention of Children Leaving

 WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 28.—
 Senator Poinexter of Washington in-
 troduced a resolution in the senate
 demanding an investigation by the
 federal bureau of labor conditions in
 regard to the strike of the textile
 workers at Lawrence, Mass. The re-
 solution will provide that the investi-
 gators report their findings to con-
 gress. Chairman Henry of the house
 rules committee has promised to give
 a hearing to the resolution of Repre-
 sentative Berger providing for a
 probe of strike conditions. This re-
 solution probably will be amended to
 provide for an investigation of the
 entire strike, including the clubbing
 of women and the refusal of the au-
 thorities to permit children of the
 strikers to leave Lawrence.

PANAMA RATE CONSPIRACY CHARGED TO RAILROADS

Congressman Alleges Corporations
 Are Uniting With Foreign Boat
 Lines to Secure Tariff Whereby
 They Will Receive All Benefits

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 28.—
 Definite charges that the transcon-
 tental railroad are "conspiring"
 with foreign steamship lines to get
 rates enforced on the Panama canal
 by which they will receive all its ben-
 efits were made here before the na-
 tional convention by Congressman
 Humphrey of Washington.

Humphrey asserted that the plan
 is to have congress make the Panama
 tolls high, and to provide for the free
 use of the canal for coastwise vessels.
 If such a measure passes he predicted
 that the "conspirators" will purchase
 scores of cheap foreign ships for the
 coastwise trade and by agreement
 will boost rates via Panama so as to
 absorb themselves all the benefits of
 the water routes from the Atlantic to
 the Pacific.

 costs less to ship a carload of crop-
 products from Germany to San Fran-
 cisco than from Cleveland to Salt Lake
 because of "shipping conspiracies."
