CRAMMED INTO BATHTUB AFTER BEING BEATEN

Murderous Attack on Aged Widow in Apartment Where She Lived Alone, and She is Later Discovered With Life Almost Extinct

NEW YORK, March 1.—Mrs. Johanna Huebner, an aged widow, was murdered in the Harlem apartment, where she lived alone, was beaten into insensibility and crammed into a bath tub, while her assailant leisurely looted her flat.

The burglar then turned on sixteen gas jets. Mrs. Huebner was found barely alive. The police at first reported that she was dead.

Frank Cooper, a negro elevator boy, was arrested and charged with the crime. According to the police Cooper has confessed, saying that he had deliberately planned it, and that after pounding the woman with his fists until she became unconscious, he obtained \$65. Thirty dollars in bills stained with blood were found in his pockets.

HARMONITES FOR ACTION NOT PROCRASTINATION

Suggestion of Senator Bacon and Others for Postponement of Baltimore National Convention Falls to Meet With Their Favor

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 1.—The Harmon headquarters in Washington gave out statements opposing the suggestion of Senator Bacon and others for a postponement of the democratic national convention scheduled at Baltimore June 25. Harmon's managers profess to see no advantage to the democratic party in lengthening the period between the republican and democratic conventions.

They claim the delegates to Baltimore will have formed their opinions before the republicans meet at Chicago, June 18, and that "the possible action of the republican national convention will have no bearing on what the democrats will have decided to do in Baltimore."

WOMEN TROUSERS WEARERS BEFORE MASCULINE FOLKS

It Was Along About 1800, When Society Women, at Balls, Wore Pink Casings for Their Nether Limbs, Said Coverings Being of Satin

KANSAS CITY, Mo., March 1.—Suffragists could have found precedent to help prove their contention that woman is the equal if not the superior of man in the lecture of Mrs. James H. Austin of this city before the Kansas City Historical Society. The lecture was a part of a pioneer exhibition being held by the society.

"I don't suppose we can get the men to admit it, but women in America wore the first trousers," Mrs. Austin said. "The style started about 1800. Men were still wearing 'small clothes.' The ball costume of a society woman of that period is described as consisting in part of pink satin trousers that extended from beneath a rather short dress skirt.

"The trousers or pantaloons were uncomfortable and expensive. The expense was met, however, by shortening them to hang from the knees, being tied with string there.

"John Quincy Adams was the first, perhaps, to introduce trousers for men into this country," concluded the speaker, "when he returned with his father, John Adams, from England."

NO LIMIT TO BARROOMS IN FRANCE YET ACCOMPLISHED

Bill to Keep Down Number of Groceries Tabled—It Proposed One to Each 300 People, Where There is One to Eighty Folks Now

PARIS, March 1.—Once again the bill designed to limit saloons in France has been tabled, and its defeat seems a foregone conclusion, the liquor interests controlling about three-fourths of the chamber. There are 480,000 saloons in France, or one for each eighty inhabitants. It is proposed to limit saloons to one for every 300. Paris has 30,000 saloons. In 1839 the average amount of intoxicants consumed annually per person was about one quart; it is more than three quarts each at present. Alcoholism is said to be responsible to a large extent for race suicide in France.
