

DYNAMITE IN GOODS TRAIN IS FIND, STRIKERS CLAIM

Disaffected Lawrence Millworkers Say It Was Planted by Mill Owners' Detective, and Assert That Strike Is Practically Won.

LAWRENCE, March 1.—Strikers assert that dynamite was found in a trainload of goods at the American Woolen Company's plant.

Strikers' leader William Haywood said: "Only dynamite located so far was planted by the mill owners' detective. Federal authorities have investigated. It is likely that local detectives with dynamite on their hands had to get rid of it hurriedly."

Strikers declare the strike is practically won.

curled on the Klamath Indian reservation, where the state courts, according to the contention of counsel, have not jurisdiction. Judge Benson said he would make a ruling later.

The first witness this afternoon was Fritz Christensen, aged 22 years, whose home is in South Dakota. He had worked for Erickson & Peterson three years, he said, and known Faulder two years. Questioned by the district attorney he said that two or three days before the killing he had heard Faulder say he would "kill any man poisoning his dog."

The court said, in response to an objection from the defendant's counsel that he would announce his ruling later. The attorney said that letting the evidence go in and ruling afterward permitted the harm to be done to the defendant by the matter already getting before the jury. Judge Benson said that the evidence was already as much before the jury as it was possible to get, so that the reservation of the ruling made no difference.

"All right," said Onell.

Witness said he was hauling lumber and ties about the time of the homicide. The day of the killing he did not see Faulder until about 3 o'clock in the afternoon. He heard Faulder fire a couple of shots and spoke to him, Faulder saying he was going to kill the — who poisoned his dog, or man that poisoned his dog. He was not sure which term Faulder used at that particular time. After Faulder left he heard shots, apparently from the direction of the cook house. Then Faulder came to him, but from where he could not tell, and said, "I've killed the —." Christensen asked "Who?" and the reply was, "Louis, the cook." "No, you didn't," said witness, and Faulder said, "Yes, I did." Faulder then said good bye, that he was going to the woods, or something like that. Witness said he then went up to the cook's tent, where he saw the cook lying on the bed. Later he saw Faulder bidding friends good bye, but saying he would see that the man was dead before he left. Later he heard two shots, which were understood to be those Faulder inflicted on himself. The men said Faulder was dead, and when he went to see, Faulder warned the men to keep away from him.

ASK STATE PROBE FOR COUNTY COURT

thousands of dollars at a discount of 5 and 10 per cent, thereby bringing the credit of the county, which was at par when they went into office, to a stage where warrants sell very slowly at a discount of 15 to 25 per cent.

"When the present county administration went into office we were in debt less than \$100,000. Warrants now unpaid amount to \$280,000. Our legal limit on outstanding warrants is \$5,000. We want to pay our county debt, but if the extravagance of the county court is not stopped we shall be forced to repudiation. Our population is approximately 10,000 and ours is not a wealthy class of people.

"Considerable road and bridge building has been done at the expense of the taxpayers, but we believe much more could have been done for the same money had personal favoritism, graft and private contract letting been eliminated. Many roadmasters have been in charge of work whose only qualification was their relationship to or loyalty towards the members of the county court.

"The court has threatened to build a court house on a tract of land outside of the legal limits of the county seat as established by a vote of the people, without asking for authority of the people. The building of a court house on this site would entail an obligation of not less than \$200,000 and the maintenance of the same as a county court house forever. This would be contrary to law, which gives the people of the county the right to move the county seat by a three-fifths vote of the people thereof. An additional expenditure of at least \$100,000 would be incurred in fitting up the grounds and furnishing the building. It would plunge the county so deeply in debt that our taxes, already unreasonably high, will be increased almost to the point of confiscation.

"These, together with many other acts, the records of which are obtainable, are, we think, ample grounds for asking that an expert investigation of our county management be made, so that some remedy may be found and some curb be placed on the wild and criminal management of our county finances. One recent story about the county court's official doings was that it had ordered \$35,000 worth of auto trucks, and that each of the commissioners was to have an individual auto. This report reached Arthur C. Lewis of the Farmers' Implement and Supply house when he was in Portland, from the J. I. Case Threshing Machine company, which asked Mr. Lewis, who represents it here, why it had not had a chance to bid on the supply. He said he had heard of no such order.

The case people said they could have afforded to give the commissioners individual autos if they had been given the order. The reported order, it is understood, was denied by the court.

LONDON'S FOOD MAY SOON BE ALL USED

LONDON, March 1.—Large factories have notified their men that they might be forced to close because of the fuel shortage. Railways fear they may be forced to suspend, bringing the total of idle to 5,000,000.

It is feared the food supply will be exhausted within two weeks. Only passenger vessels are leaving Liverpool port, and the coal supply is hunched. The home office estimates that 1,049,047 miners are out.

Mine operators and government men again conferred and adjourned to Tuesday.

Troops are ready, and the strikers are quiet.

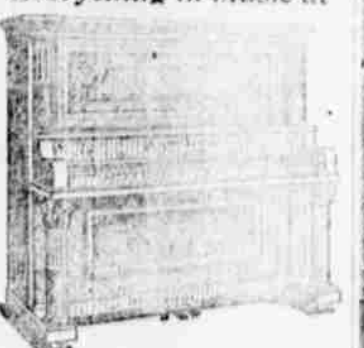
