ANYTHING TO GET VOTES

WE ARE afraid that Mr. Sanderson gives the people of this city very little credit for intelligence if he thinks that they are going to fall for his bluff on the municipal ownership of a water system. If he thinks his carefully laid plan of trying to convince the voters that it is necessary to adopt his charter, providing for a bond issue of half a million dollars, in order to secure pure water for the city, he will find that he is badly mistaken.

When the people of this city authorize the issuance of any more bonds they will do it only for a specific purpose, and will know that it is going to be used for that purpose only. When the people desire to vote bonds to build a water system they can at the same time amend their charter raising the bond limit, and it will not be necessary to swallow the entire Sanderson charter, defects and all.

Mr. Sanderson should know that no engineer could do justice to a job of the magnitude of the proposed water system at Aspen Lake, at this time of the year, and with the amount of snow on the ground, as at present. In addition it is not to be wondered at that the council should object to this extra expense, when the mayor has already expended a large amount of money in getting a survey and estimate from another engineer.

The fact that the mayor would go to the useless expense of sending the city engineer and a crew of men out on a survey in the middle of winter, as is the condition in the Aspen Lake section, shows the extent he would go to promote his election and the adoption of his charter. It is not a question of what it is going to cost the taxpayer, and is in line with his calling a special election two weeks before the regular election. We are surprised that Mr. Sanderson does not tell the people what the urgent necessity of this special election is.
