WHY NOT FIGHT FAIRLY?

THE special election April 23 is an outrageous mulcting of poor taxpayer. There is no more square, honest cause for this unnecessary expense than there is for the fifth wheel on a wagon. Regardless of one or a dozen possible charters to be voted on, the fixing of a special election approximately a fortnight before the regular city election, at which both issues could well be determined, is just one more sample of the careless, heedless, reckless, foolish way of transacting city business which has helped to stir up the people to the sense of a continued indignity.

But there is one thing that sticks up plainly, and that is, the fixing of the special election day for acting on the charter favored by the city council is an acknowledgment of the weakness of that charter. Knowing that the commission form of charter for the city government will go on the ballot for the regular election of the city April 6th, the proponents of the council's charter are fearful of disaster to it if it came up in a fair, face-to-face, stand-up-and-take-your-medicine fight.

This is especially true when is considered the fact that City Attorney Horace M. Manning has very plainly told the council that the defects in the commission instrument, which he pointed out to that body, were enough to vitiate it, in his opinion, even if it were voted on favorably by the people. If the council's own legal adviser tells them that the instrument they fear is so weak that it cannot stand, even with the approval of a majority of the voters, is it not plain proof of the lack of faith they have in their own document, which they deem valid, that they are afraid to match it on even terms against the one submitted by advocates of the commission form of government?

A RATIONAL CALENDAR

THE calendar and the hours of the day seem to most of us almost like a part of the natural and immutable order of things, and however much trouble the present indefensible system caused, men have felt that it was rash—almost impious—to suggest a change in it.

"Give us back our eleven days!" cried the mob when the Gregorian calendar was introduced into Great Britain. From the days of Julius Caesar to our own, he has been a bold reformer indeed who would suggest changes in the disorderly procession of the months.

Now enters Moses B. Cotsworth of Victoria, B. C., with a proposal for a rational calendar. He would divide the year into thirteen months, each of twenty-eight days, which would leave one extra day in the year, and this he beautifully plans as a free day for everyone—free from interest charges on money, the necessity to work, the wage scale, etc.

Then each month would commence on Sunday and the first, eighth, fifteenth and twenty-second days of each month would be Sundays.

President Hadley of Yale is quoted as saying that the month of four weeks "will come as a commercial necessity." The adjustment to the change would be very small compared to that necessitated when standard time was introduced on transcontinental railways. Mr. Cotsworth has literature to distribute, poking fun at the present system.
