LETTERS FROM THE PEOPLE

Editor Herald:

It is safe to indulge the presumption that it is well nigh impossible for all hands to dispense with the enthusiasm universally prevalent at the initiatory stages of any proposed public improvement, and get back to terra firma long enough to look at the business end of the matter. But some of us who can ought to steady down long enough to review the water supply proposition in a calm, dispassionate manner—I might add, incidentally, in an intelligent manner, if possible.

The action of the authorities in securing and filing on a water supply is commendable, and merits approval. Mr. Emmitt's report indicates an ample supply, and the elevation at this source or intake sufficient to distribute the supply by gravity flow to Shipplington and the elevated resident sections of the city.

Mr. Emmitt's proposition to the council includes the following items: Iron pipe, 1,004 tons, 4 miles 20-inch; 9 miles 14-inch. \$122,000

Hauling and distribution of said pipe 5,000

Trenching and back filling 8,000

Total \$135,000.

Obviously this is all Mr. Emmitt can afford to do for \$135,000.

Without entering into discussion as to the sufficiency of the size of the pipe from the standpoint of distance, friction and future growth, let us take into consideration a few other items.

This water supply must be developed and emounded, and quite extensive preparations made for protection of the watershed from invasion near the source.

I note that the impounding feature contemplates a reservoir "210 feet across each way" and 25 feet deep.

This item is not included in Mr. Emmitt's proposition, either.

Just what the scheme is for handling the water at the city end of the pipe line I am not advised. It may contemplate the impounding of the water at some point on the West Side preparatory to turning it into distributing mains throughout the city, or it may may contemplate direct connection with the distributing system.

If the impounding plan was the most practicable, another reservoir of considerable capacity must needs be constructed. The distributing system is another item of cost not embraced in Mr. Emmitt's proposition.

Briefly summarized we have:

Mr. Emmitt's proposition to construct the pipe line from source of supply to some point near city on West Side, for \$135,000

The next pertinent is what will the aforementioned items cost, viz.:

Development of supply \$135,000

Watershed protection \$10,000

Impounding reservoir \$10,000

Impounding reservoir at city end of pipe line \$10,000

Distributing mains and laterals \$10,000

In the opinion of the writer the whole approximate cost should be carefully determined in advance of the consideration of any proposal for construction of any one part.

It is not the part of good business for Klamath Falls to allow itself to be carried off its feet by the apparent reasonableness of the cost of construction of one unit of the system, the cost of the whole system being an unknown quantity. Or frightened by the bugaboo "immediate action must be taken to pipe this water to the city."

It might develop upon ascertaining the approximate cost of constructing the whole system that in addition to our present bonded debt of \$95,550,—conceding that Ulin & Co. take the last bonds authorized—the city could not undertake the construction of the whole system. In that event would it not be advisable to confine our efforts and expenditures to the development of and in preparation for impounding the supply? Under the filling we have until 1917 to show actual use, and upon good showing that time may be extended. It seems to the writer that a city with a population of 5,000 ought not to undertake too much in the way of municipal improvements in the first years of its limelight existence. Hypothecating the future to too great an extent is dangerous, to say the least. Let the city keep on safe ground for two or three years longer, and watch the surrounding country develop.

We have no reason to fear from a water famine, and the present supply can be safeguarded from contamination.

RICH FIND IN FIREPLACE WHEN OAK CHEST APPEARS

Discovery in Historic Homestead Which Has Had so Many Tenants That It's Impossible to Trace the Ownership of box of coin

ASHBURY, N. J., March 6.—Borden Jeffrey of Deal Lake is \$150,000 richer today as the result of spending a few dollars in repairing an ancient fireplace in an old Colonial homestead which he recently purchased. Workmen, while fixing the fireplace, turned up a cache which contained an oak chest full of gold and silver coins. Their value, it is said, is about \$150,000. There has long been a belief that much treasure is buried in this section of Ashbury Park. In the early days Deal Lake was a shipbuilding center, vessels at that time being able to sail from the lake out to sea. A changing coast formation and diversion of industry to more favorable harbors closed the shipbuilding industry.

The homestead is one of the country's historic relics. The house has had so many tenants it is impossible to trace the ownership of the chest of treasure.

CITY OF MEXICO REACHED BY CADILLAC

Extract from news item taken from the San Francisco Examiner:

Completing one of the most remarkable trips ever made in an automobile, T. J. Beaudett is reported to have arrived in the City of Mexico, having made the trip down the west coast of Mexico from Los Angeles in a Cadillac car.

According to reports received by Don Lee, California distributor of Cadillac cars, Beaudett reached the City of Mexico at the conclusion of his strenuous trip only to be arrested on suspicion.

Over two thousand two hundred miles were covered on the route between Los Angeles and the City of Mexico, and according to reports of Beaudett most of this distance was made over a country that had never been traversed by a vehicle of any kind.

In passing through the town of San Juan Del Rio, one hundred miles from the City of Mexico, the car was stopped by a gang of Mexicans, who chased Beaudett out of town. He was forced to pass several towns which had been captured by insurgents, and not only were the people of Mexico surprised that he should bring a car down the west coast, but the fact that he was able to have pierced the very center of the insurrectionary country created general interest.

The car is to be placed on exhibition by the agent of the Cadillac in the City of Mexico, and will later be shipped back to the San Francisco branch of the Don Lee company.

Never in the history of motor touring has a machine been placed through such a severe test. Hundreds of miles of the route traveled by Beaudett was nothing but wilderness, and was the most difficult problem to make any headway over. In fact Beaudett reports that on one stretch of country he was four days going thirty miles. This distance was the most difficult of the entire trip to make, and it proved a severe test on both Beaudett and the car.

The trail over which a great deal of the trip was made was washed out in places, and the car had to be blocked up, and only with the use of block and tackle was it possible to get the car out of some of the holes. Beaudett reports that he had to practically build a road for a great part of the distance over the highest range of mountains. The trip demonstrated the durability of the car, and is undoubtedly one of the most dangerous and severe pathfinding trips ever made by motor car.
