

## FEDERAL BUILDING ASSURED BY BOURNE

### COMMITTEE FAVORS

#### SENATOR SENDS CHEERFUL MESSAGE TO SECRETARY OLIVER, WHO READS IT TO MEN AT LUNCHEON

That a federal building is assured for Klamath Falls was made known this afternoon in a telegram from Senator Jonathan Bourne to Secretary John T. Oliver of the Chamber of Commerce, which was read at the Friday luncheon held by the Chamber at the Livermore grill. While the secretary of members and their heads was seated a messenger boy brought in the message to Secretary Oliver, who immediately read it to the company.

The telegram read as follows: "As member of senate committee on public buildings and grounds I am authorized to favorably report on Chamberlain's bill calling for \$2,000 for public building in your city, with amendment increasing appropriation \$12,000, making total \$14,000.—Jonathan Bourne Jr., U. S. S."

Postmaster Clyde K.
