THE HIGHER COST OF FOOD

UNTIL all prices fall the cost of
meat, vegetables, cereals, but-
ter, eggs and cheese will continue to
fluctuate at higher figures than have
been experienced before in a genera-
tion, says the New York Times. When
a general adjustment takes place upon
a lower plane, the cost of foodstuffs
will still be proportionately higher.
The census reports of population
show this. The cities cannot keep
growing out of all proportion to the
increase in the rural districts without
a reduction in the per capita food sup-
ply. Labor saving machinery on the
farms has done much. But James J.
Hill has shown that though the aver-
age yield of farm lands has increased
and their value has been enhanced
they are still insufficiently manured,
and production has not begun to keep
pace with the increasing millions who
must be fed. When the problem be-
comes acute enough, the farmers who
manifest a reluctance to thrive by the
plow, and the tollers in the city who
would not be laborers in the vineyard,
will experience a change of heart.

the Oregon building at the Panama
exposition, says the Oregon Journal.
Defamatory editorials and news

that among the many thousands who
have heretofore been together, a few
now take a different stand.
"Where progressives have lost one
man in the present contest they have
gained thousands who believe in the
teachings and policies of Theodore
Roosevelt. The result is not in
doubt."
