DEBATERS MEET TO TALK TARIFF

TEAMS REPRESENTING GRANTS PASS AND KLAMATH FALLS HIGH SCHOOLS WILL ARGUE AT OPERA HOUSE

Tonight at Houston's opera house is to be the occasion of the debate of the high school team from Grants Pass against the speakers selected from the Klamath county high school.

The visiting team is composed of Earl Best and Neil Allan.

Miss Helen Love was to have come with the Grants Pass team as one of the speakers of the evening, but was prevented by illness. The local school authorities, learning of the crippling of the opposing team, offered to Professor Turner and the visiting speakers to put the teams on an equal basis by having Miss Short remain silent tonight, her argument to be read by one of the two young men. This method is to be pursued by the Grants Pass team, one of the pair of advocates to read her portion of the debate.

The offer of the Klamath Falls authorities was declined with thanks, and the visitors will go on with their shortened force, one of them speaking for the absent girl, while the trio of local tariff students will speak in the customary fashion.

Those who will speak for the Klamath Falls institution are Miss Florence Short, Forest Peil and Edwin Cox. The home team is the same that debated against the Ashland high school here some weeks ago. The visit of the Grants Pass speakers is of unusual interest to the high school students and their friends in this city for the reason that high school teams from the same two cities have met on two former occasions, and both times the Klamath Falls representatives were defeated.

The subject on the rostrum tonight is to be, in substance: "Resolved, that the policy of the United States should be aimed toward a gradual abandonment of the protective tariff."

The visitors will take the affirmative and the home team the negative side, which is the same arrangement that was in effect when the Ashland team appeared here and lost the argument.

The home speakers have been under the tutelage of Prof. M. D. Coates,

and expect to make fully as good a showing tonight as they did on the occasion of the last debate.

The judges tonight will be Judge Henry L. Benson, Charles F. Stone and ex-Judge George Noland. Rev. Stubbins will preside.

Mr. Turner, superintendent of instruction of Grants Pass, who accompanied from that city the debaters who are to compete against the local high school students, delivered a short talk to the student body and faculty this morning in the assembly room. He expressed himself as being very glad to have the opportunity of visiting this part of the country, and especially the high school.

His main theme was concerning education and its value in dollars and cents. He gave an example of how it could be figured up in as near a correct an estimate as possible. The earnings of the educated man and the uneducated were compared to the relative value of what they were able to do. He said that a certain building in New York was torn down for the purpose of laying a stronger base. So should the student of the high school lay his base so that he would be able to lift his morals to a higher standard.

Mr. Turner concluded with a statement of the prosperity of the great state of Oregon and the development that has been made in the last few years.
