**PRESIDENT'S WORK TOO LITTLE KNOWN**  
Study of Taft Administration Shows Much of Value Has Been Done.

Savagely attacked by members of his own party as no president has held the belief that his work in constructive statesmanship should speak for itself as a complete refutation of these charges and that no explanations were necessary. In the long run wrongs right themselves, but in the past year the attacks of extremists in both parties have been so unreasonable that the administration side must be considered before any fair man can form his opinion of President Taft's work.

He could have accomplished much more beneficial legislation had it not been for factions in his own party and partisanship among the Democrats. These are the ones who bitterly criticize his administration. When President Taft recommended anything these extremists have shouted for, they refused to support it. The best known work of his administration is all distinctly progressive, but those who so pride themselves on their progressive principles refused to back this legislation.

**Opposed at Every Turn.**  
Notwithstanding all this, President Taft has accomplished more in the way of constructive, progressive legislation than any president of recent times. His work is too little understood and has never been sufficiently exploited. He has accomplished those things in the face of such tremendous opposition as might well have discouraged almost anyone.

He has done more to annihilate the trusts than any other president in the history of the country. A number of the biggest trusts in the United States have been dissolved, notably the Standard Oil and Tobacco trusts. During his three years in office, President Taft's administration has instituted, under the Sherman Anti-trust Act, 37 prosecutions of illegal combinations of capital. Many of these suits are now under way and the people may look for their favorable conclusion. The best former record was made by President Roosevelt, who, in his seven years in office, from 1901 to 1908, caused 44 suits to be brought against the trusts.

**Redeems Tariff Pledge.**  
Perhaps the most unjust criticism directed at any recent administration was that turned against President Taft for his handling of the Payne Tariff bill. Yet he is the only president since Cleveland who has called congress together in special session to revise the tariff, something he insisted upon as carrying out a definite party pledge. Despite all the misrepresentation that has gone over the country, the Payne Tariff bill was a distinct gain. It gave an average lowering of the rates of 8 per cent. It gave fair treatment to the Philippines. It created a tariff board and a court of customs appeals. It levied a corporation tax, which not only produces an annual revenue of \$27,000,000, but affords the government access to the books of all corporations. It produces sufficient revenue to run the government and has turned a deficit into a surplus. It encouraged the importation of art objects for educational purposes by removing the duty on such objects.

The early completion of the Panama canal, of tremendous benefit to the people of this state, is due to the vigorous prosecution of the work under the president's direction.

He has established intelligent conservation, dealing with this vexing problem in his usual far-seeing way. Agricultural lands included in forest reserves are to be released for settlement and lands held by the government are to be administered in the interests of the whole people.

**Works for Parcel Post.**  
President Taft's administration is doing everything possible to secure the adoption of the parcel post. This reform has long been sought by the people of the agricultural districts but the opposition of the interests has always been sufficient to defeat it. There is every prospect of success in securing its adoption.

President Taft's administration has wiped out the postal deficit, that is as old as the service itself, and a lower rate on letters is being discussed as a lively probability in the near future.

President Taft has accomplished the establishment of the postal savings bank, an absolutely safe custodian for the people's money.

President Taft's great work for world-wide peace, through his arbitration treaties, is of such recent date as to be still fresh in the public mind. This is a service to all humanity.

That the president possesses firmness when necessary is shown by his promptness in abrogating the Russian treaty when the rights of American citizens were infringed upon.

**KLAMATH FALLS COURT GETS SUPPORT**

From Portland Telegram  
SALEM, Or., March 7.—Corroborating a letter recently written to Governor West by William Worden, county judge of Klamath county, C. T. Oliver, secretary and manager of the Klamath Chamber of Commerce, today forwarded to the governor a communication declaring the Klamath Commercial Club to be composed of "obstructionists," that its meetings are not public, and that the whole fight made on the county court is of a personal and political nature.

The club recently wrote to the governor, charging the court with graft. The Chamber of Commerce was organized six years ago, and is the only public organization in Klamath; but the Klamath Commercial Club's deliberations are private, and that it does not stand for progress. He expresses the opinion that but six or seven men are back of the charges sent by the Commercial Club to the governor, accusing the county court of graft, and says the charges are untrue.

The county court spends large sums of money, but accomplishes much, he declares, and the people are proud of it, and says the old poor farm was not suitable, and while the new farm and infirmary cost much money, the people should take pride in an institution like it. The statement made by the Commercial Club that better land could be obtained for \$40 an acre, he pronounces false.

Governor West has not yet taken action with relation to the matter.

From Portland Journal:  
"The charges filed against the county court and county judge of Klamath are silly, ridiculous and unworthy of consideration by any fair minded person," said W. P. Johnson, general manager and secretary of the Klamath Development company, today.

"First comes the sale of the old infirmary site and the purchase of a new site from C. E. Worden, father of County Judge Will S. Worden, by the county court. The old infirmary site was a bleak and dreary rockpile of little value, while the new site consisting of seventy-five acres is a most slightly spot, and is under the irrigation ditch. It was purchased at a price of \$100 an acre, and it worth a great deal more than that as an investment for anybody. A modern and finely appointed infirmary building has been erected, a structure that would be a credit to any community.

"The second charge has to do with road building. The county court is made up of enterprising men who want to keep Klamath county in the front rank for road building. More than 140 miles of improved highways have been rebuilt, and more than sixty miles of old roads repaved.

"The third point involved is the court house fight. That has been of standing, and is not a vital issue at all. Our Klamath Development company has offered an attractive site of five acres, and has agreed to grade the tract and to furnish the hot water for heating the building. A straw vote taken a year ago shows that the majority of the people of the county favor the removal to that site. The Commercial Club clique has offered small and undesirable sites of a quarter block or so, and not one of them can compare in any sense with the one our company had agreed to donate.

"If the Commercial Club had assisted the county court in handling the county warrants, the credit of Klamath would not be challenged. As it is, the county's credit is the best it ever was, and the very men who refused to help the county dispose of the warrants are the men who are attacking the credit of the county."
