A LIVING FROM FARMING

A COPY of the Long Island Agri-
onomist, which, under the title of
"Business Farmers," says:

"Can anyone make a living farm-
ing?" is the question asked of us
daily by some one of the numerous
modern methods communications. The
answer to this each time it is asked
is practically the same, and is as fol-
lows:

"In our personal experience we
have never known a farmer who did
not make a living and practically al-
ways a better one than the same man
of the same capital or the same
knowledge, or the same energy, or
the same brain power, could make in
any other profession or business.

"Some farmers, like some manu-
facturers or business men, make what
is called a 'fair' or 'good' living. Some
farmers, like some manufacturers,
merchants or professional men, make
fortunes, and in farming life, as in
other methods of securing a liveli-
hood, these three contrasting kinds
of success are found side by side in
the same community, be that com-
munity where it may, and in the farm-
ing community it is extremely easy
to make an estimate and to draw an
absolutely just conclusion, for nearly
always the hand-to-mouth man, his
so-called well-to-do neighbor, and
likewise their rich neighbor had times
without number identically the same
start in life: oftentimes practically the
same acreage, the same buildings, the
same animals and the same tools;
also the same market and the same
transportation facilities.

"At the end of ten years the hand-
to-mouth individual is barely coming
out even. The well-to-do man has his
home and farm fitted with modern
labor and brain saving appliances
and conveniences. The quality of his
stock is improved. He has earned
more money, spent more money, and
has more money in the bank than the
other fellow.

"The rich man has in the same peri-
od of time greatly increased his acre-
age, fitted up his farm and home with
every convenience he has run against,
and in addition is enjoying the luxu-
ries his surplus enables him to se-
cure. Very easy is it for any individ-
ual of even average observation and
powers of reasoning to arrive at an
absolutely correct reason for this
marked difference in farming success,
for not the slightest argument is ne-
cessary to prove conclusively that
these varying degrees of achievement
are due utterly and entirely to the in-
dividual, and no law, no ruling or
regulation, nor even a system of
eugenics can ever be devised to make
all men and women equal, for while
rank and exists, under the most dis-
heartening circumstances, certain in-
dividuals will achieve pronounced
success, likewise will it always re-
main true that under the most favor-
able conditions many individuals will,
throughout their lives, have a contin-
ual uphill struggle to make a bare
living.

"The year 1911 was the third of a
droughty series. We know of a
farmer who lost all his potatoes, all
his tomatoes and all his corn. We
know of another who secured from 45
to 57 bushels of potatoes to the acre.
We know of another who averaged
210 bushels, and these three farmers
were tilling identically the same soil
under identically the same climatic
conditions in the same community,
with practically the same financial re-
sources.

"It is, therefore, manifest that the
differences were due entirely to the
individual. No outside variances en-
tered at all. Therefore we have
proof positive that it lies with the in-
dividual to garner a thousand fold, a
hundred fold or to split even, and we
see annually in all sections of the
country the most shiftless individuals
putting forth the minimum of effort,
yet securing a living by methods
which in any line of manufacturing
or mercantile business or in any one
of the professions would result in ab-
solute failure and hopeless bank-
ruptcy."

CENTRAL OREGON SHIPPING HOGS

VALUABLE OBJECT LESSON ON
CHANGE FROM RANGE AND
WHEAT RANCHING TO DIVERSI-
FIED FARMING

PORTLAND, March 11.—A new
era in the development of Central
Oregon and the Deschutes Valley be-
gan with the receipt on March 8 at
the Portland Union Stockyards of a
carload of 104 hogs. They took the
top price of the season, \$6.95 per
hundredweight. The most significant
feature of the transaction was that
they had been fattened on alfalfa and
finished on wheat, the total cost to
the growers being \$3.50 per hundred-
weight. The hogs were loaded at
Opal City and Madras.

The stockyards officials were de-
lighted over the transaction. They

say it is the most valuable object les-
son on the change from range and
bonanza wheat ranching to intensi-
fied farming conditions.
