LAWRENCE CONDITIONS BAD, ADMITS ONE STOCKHOLDER

Would Willing Accept Smaller Div-
dends if Officials Would Give Mil-
lworkers Enough to Live on Decent-
ly, He Declares

Special to The Herald
Portland, March 12.—That the re-
cent press dispatches picturing the al-
most intolerable living and working
conditions of the Lawrence (Mass.)
textile workers have not been over-
drawn is the assertion of James Car-
michael of New York, a stockholder
in the woolen mills at Lawrence, who
is visiting Portland.

"I get 7 per cent on my stock," said
Carmichael, "but would willingly ac-
cept less if the officials would give
the millworkers enough to live de-
cently—something most of them can
not afford to do now."

"Stunted boys are forced to toil in
the mills before they are 12 years
old. The average wage for an adult
is under \$5 weekly. Living and work-
ing conditions are deplorable. The
unskilled employees are forced to live
in cheap, ill-lighted, ill-ventilated
tenements. The facts of the case are
revolting. I know the demands for
more wages are justified."
