WHO IS A LIAR?

FROM the above caption which
headed an article in a recent
issue of the morning paper, one
would be led to believe that our
friend Evans was trying to start
something. Even from the second
issue of his paper he has seemed to
be going around with a chip on his
shoulder and anticipating trouble
where none exists. In the present
case it would be much braver and
more manly for Mr. Evans to call at
the office and make this statement to
us in person. If he has any personal
feeling in the matter we could easily
settle it without publicity.

However, we are inclined to be-
lieve that this breach of newspaper
courtesy is due to inexperience rather
than intent. While editorially news-
papers are often opposed to each other,
and take opposite sides of public
questions, this opposition does not
devolve into the personal. Most
newspaper men are supposed to be
gentlemen, and no gentleman would
call another a liar, unless he does it
to his face.

ABOUT THE PRINTING BID

SINCE Mayor Sanderson has seen
fit to have the city council resolu-
tion to a considerable extent, and has
published same as a justification of
his action, we feel compelled to give
our readers the exact facts in the
case. We will say that at no time
has the Herald complained because
it did not receive the printing of the
mayor's charter. We never expected
to get the job, and have not the least
fault to find against the mayor hav-
ing the printing done at the North-
western office. It is only to be ex-
pected that wherever possible a man
is going to favor the paper that is
friendly and supports him.

Before the Sanderson-Manning
charter was ever submitted to the
council Mr. Sanderson came to the
editor of this paper, and asked what
it would cost to print 700 and also a
price on 1,000 copies. We knew that
Mr. Sanderson was not going to give
us the job, and we were confident
that Mr. Sanderson knew that he was
not deceiving us with any such hope.
We told Mr. Sanderson that 700
copies in 11-point type would would
be worth \$2.25 a page, and 1,000
copies \$2.75 a page. That evening
Mr. Sanderson called us up on the
phone and said: "Say, Smith, Wrenn
underbid you on that charter." He
then stated that Wrenn had bid
\$2.30 for 700 copies and \$2.70 for
1,000 copies.

We considered the matter a joke
all the way through, and in no way
could our price be considered in the
light of a competitive bid. The fact
that Mr. Wrenn's price was secured
last and that there was just 5 cents
difference in each case, shows the
object of Mr. Sanderson getting a
price from the Herald. We do not
object to Mr. Sanderson giving the
city printing to anyone he may see
fit, but we do object to his attempt to
make us out a liar. There is no
one sort of a bid considered in the
granting of contracts by public offi-
cials, and that is the sealed bid.

killed, and many were wounded.

fight. Troops have been rushed to
the scene.

**IMPROVEMENTS TO BE
MADE ON NAYLOX ROAD**

Attention Given to Drainage During
the Winter Months Has Prevented
the Usual Damage From Water,
and Road is in Good Shape

Wm. Uhrmann of Dairy, with four
men, has gone to Naylox to begin
work on the county road. Improve-
ments are to be made from Naylox
toward this city. Mr. Uhrmann states
that the roads are in better shape for
this time of the year than any year
that he knows of. Jasper Hubbard
has been keeping up the roads and
attending to the drainage ditches dur-
ing the winter, and as a consequence
no very heavy damage has been done
to the roads during the wet months.
There are several big rocks in the
road at the Barclay Springs curve,
which interfere with traffic, and these
are to be removed. At the present
time it is impossible for teams and
automobiles to pass at this point.
