ELLIS WELL QUALIFIED

AT THE primary election in April the republicans of this county will be called upon to make their choice of a man to represent their party on the ticket as a candidate for congress. ROOSEVELT CHOICE OF UNIVERSITY OF OREGON

Straw Vote Cast by Students Gives "Teddy" Rousing Majority as the Man to Lead Nation—Taft Is Next Choice of the Future Greats

EUGENE, Ore., March 18.—By a "straw vote" taken at the University of Oregon last week for choice as president of the United States, Theodore Roosevelt received a vote of 169, beating his nearest competitor, Wm. Taft, by 53 votes.

On the woman suffrage question the vote was 257 for and 226 against. The judicial recall and single tax questions both lost by a large majority, while student self government was favored by a vote of 365 to 103. This was the first "fake" election ever pulled off at the university, and it met with the hearty support of the students, and will no doubt be repeated.
