REGISTER

THE city charter provides that "It
shall be the DUTY of every elector
of the city of Klamath Falls, be-
tween the first day of March and 6
o'clock p. m. on the fifteenth day of
April of each year, to register with
the police judge of Klamath Falls." It
also provides that "Upon the day
of election the judges of such
election shall ask every elector
whether he is registered, and shall
also examine the register; and if it
appears that the elector is not regis-
tered in the ward in which he applies
to vote, his vote shall not be re-
ceived."

There is to be both a special and
general election in this city this
spring, and those who wish to have a
voice in the city government should
see that their name is upon the regis-
ter. It is very easy to put the mat-
ter off until it is too late. It won't do
to make a kick then, as there is no
way under the law that will permit an
elector to vote in the city election
who has not registered. Better at-
tend to it today, you may be busy to-
morrow.

The registration books for the
county are open at the court house,
and it is necessary to register both for
the city and county elections. If you
have already registered see that your
friends do so also.

SOUTH AFRICA ENTERS MEN IN OLYMPIC MEET

NEW YORK, March 20.—South Af-
rica may prove to be one of the chief
rivals of the United States for honors
at the Olympic games, according to
advice received by the American
committee. The men chosen by South
Africa virtually are unknown here,
but are said to show great possi-
bilities. The South Africans still point
with pride to the great showing made
by Walker, Hoffer and Dunker in
the Olympic of 1908. Their team this
year will consist of eight men. The
team is weak in the sprints, but has
good men—Patching and Victor—for
the quarter, half and mile. In the
jumping department the Africans
have a youth named Stegmann, who
can consistently show 23 feet. They
expect to shine in the marathon with
K. K. Arthur, who is said to be in a
class by himself in this distance.
