TAFT AND CONSERVATION

Nothing But a Theory Until He Took the Matter in Hand.

Professional conservationists, like Mr. Pinchot, are prominent in the anti-Taft movement. But up to the time Taft entered the White House, conservation had been only a propaganda, a thing talked about. Roosevelt had done useful work in arousing public sentiment favorable to conservation, but the situation demanded someone who would lay down a definite legislative policy.

President Taft did this and the bills he has recommended are awaiting action by Congress. The delay has been with Congress, not the president.

President Taft's speech at the National Conservation congress at St. Paul in 1910, is admitted by everybody interested in the subject, to be the clearest declaration upon conservation that has been made since the matter of legislation came up for consideration.

President Taft has made mistakes. He called Ballinger to his cabinet, but he snailly dropped him for the vice-

president of the National Conservation Association. He was inclined to be a little too liberal with the states in the matter of water power, but he changed his view and an editorial in the Outlook in February just passed commends his position on conservation.

Taft is big enough to admit his own mistakes and to correct them. It is a settled policy with La Follette never to yield to a position or to answer any charge made against him in the belief that the charge will be forgotten if he keeps silent long enough. If Colonel Roosevelt ever yet has admitted that he made a mistake the news has not reached Washington.

President Taft No Weasling. On the great national questions of the day, tariff, trusts, conservation, and the rest, it should be understood that the obstacle to satisfactory legislation is congress, not the White House. The president stands ready to sign any bill sent to him that does not violate the pledges on which he was elected. He stands ready to veto any bill embodying false principles or ignorance, however popular at the moment, and even though the veto may visit him a re-election.

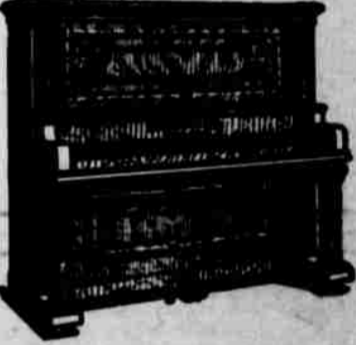
