LA FOLLETTE VS. TAFT IS ISSUE IN OREGON

PORTLAND, March 23.—Con-
sidering the issue narrowed down to a
fight between Senator La Follette
and President Taft, followers of the
latter in Oregon today are making
every effort to defeat the Wisconsin
senator. W. B. Ayer, chairman of
the Taft campaign committee in Ore-
gon, sent out an appeal to the repub-
lican voters to register so that the
full strength of President Taft may
be mustered. Senator La Follette's
supporters today predict that he will
carry Oregon easily.

CARLTON SPENCER TO REPRESENT OREGON

EUGENE, Ore., March 23.—Carl-
ton Spencer, of Cottage Grove, was
the orator chosen in the tryouts held
this week to represent the University
of Oregon in its annual oratorical
contest with the State Universities
of Washington and Montana, to take
place at Missoula, May 25. Spencer
was the winner of the State Inter-
collegiate Contest last year, and two
years ago, as a Freshman, won the
Alumni Debate Medal given annually
to the best debater in the University.

ALLEN GANG OF OUTLAWS SEEKING A COMPROMISE

A SUDDEN DEMAND FOR OREGON FLAX

SALEM, Ore., March 23.—With
the view of securing 2000 acres of
flax, Western Manager Smith of the
American Linseed Company, and H.
A. Brewer, of Portland, paid a visit
to the city. They were escorted to
the home of Eugene Bosse by Secre-
tary of State Olcott and State Treas-
urer Kay. Bosse is the pioneer flax
man in the valley and for years has
labored hard to get the industry on
a paying basis. Bosse at present is
ill and was unable to agree to secure
the 2000 acres, but gave assurance
of 200 or 300 acres.

Bosse has for years contended that
the flax raised in the valley is better
than any in the United States, and
has believed that the day would come
when manufacturers would recognize
that fact, and the visit to the valley
of the two manufacturers seems to
indicate that his belief was well
founded, and that his dreams may
come true.
