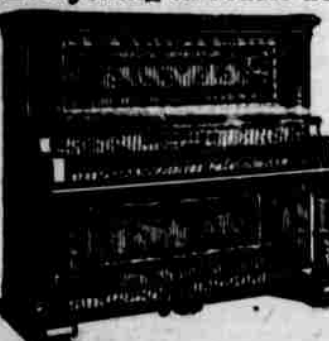

CHINESE SLAVE GIRL CHARGED WITH THEFT

SAN FRANCISCO, March 26.—
