THE DOG AND THE OWNER

BY A MOTION passed by the city council last night the city attorney was instructed to prepare an ordinance for passage by the council prohibiting the running of dogs at large in the city. If this measure should become a law of the city it would be necessary for the owners to keep their dogs tied up all of the time or else lead them around by a string or chain.

There are some seventy-four dog owners who have this year paid their \$2.50 or \$7.50 for the privilege of allowing their dogs to run loose within the city, and it would hardly appeal to these people as a square deal if they should now be forced to keep these animals tied up in their yards.

The city has in the past had many and various dog regulations, most of which have been more or less of a farce in their enforcement. In the past the officers have started out by making a big talk of what they were going to do to those who did not pay their dog tax. All those who owned good dogs have faithfully come to the front and dug up, but after a while the matter was forgotten, and no serious attempt made to enforce the law.

This has been the first year that it has looked as if the tax law was going to be enforced. The police chief has stated that the law was going to be carried out, irrespective of dog or owner, and the number of licenses already issued is evidence that he is making good his word.

Some time ago, through a motion of a member of the council who does not own a dog, the city attorney was instructed to draft an ordinance providing for a tax of \$5 and \$10. The injustice of this was evidently recognized, for it never materialized. Now the poor dog is to be tied up, if the wishes of some of the council are carried out, but we trust that this proposed measure will meet the fate of others equally as ridiculous.

THE Y. M. C. A.

IT WOULD be a matter of interest to know just how many people are taking the right kind of a view of the Y. M. C. A. project that is being attempted by the young men of this city. In an article which appeared in the Telegram a few nights ago it was stated that the Y. M. C. A. of Portland was in receipt of \$50,000 as a donation given by Mr. Peter W. Severson. Now, if a man like Mr. Severson sees fit to donate such a large sum to the cause of the Y. M. C. A. movement, it looks as if the people of this city ought to contribute something for its maintenance and welfare. The young men are striving hard to establish such an organization in this community, and they should receive sufficient backing to enable them to get recognition from the head organizer at Portland.

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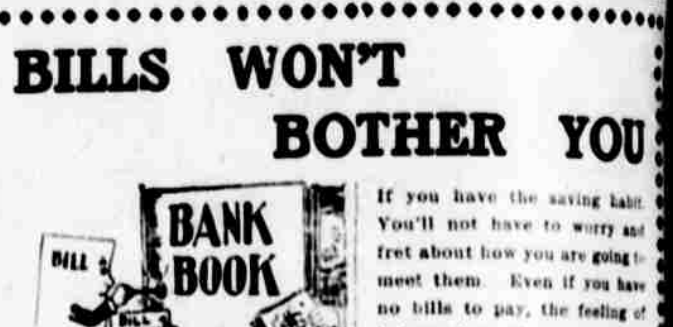
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
