MANY OREGON CITIES WOULD SEE LA FOLLETTE

PORTLAND, March 29.—Calls for
speeches by Senator La Follette when
he comes to Oregon are accumulating
at the headquarters in this city.
Thomas McCusker, manager of the
Wisconsin man's campaign, is yet un-
certain how many invitations can be
accepted. He is endeavoring to get
definite word, so the itinerary can be
arranged.

R. G. Smith, the democratic mayor
of Grants Pass, has written to ask for
a speech by La Follette in that city.
John P. Rusk wants La Follette in
La Grande, his home town, for a
speech, and offers to take charge of
arrangements there if a meeting can
be secured. A. F. Hofer has written
to ask for a speech by the senator at
Salem, and Medford and Ashland
have made application.

Several La Follette clubs have been
formed, and others are under way.
Reports of the growth of La Follette
sentiment have come from Tillamook,
Hubbard, McMinnville, Hermiston,
Woodville, and other points in the
state.

McCusker wants La Follette sup-
porters to come to his office in the
Lumbermen's building and register,
particularly men from Wisconsin. He
has made preliminary plans for a
Wisconsin club and for a general La
Follette club to be organized in Port-
land prior to the arrival of the sen-
ator next month.

Thousands of Taft buttons and
pamphlets are being sent over the
state from Taft headquarters. The
Taft literature includes the speech of
Secretary of War Stimson at Chicago
and a pamphlet dealing with the third
term question.

Roosevelt headquarters, in charge
of Fred W. Mulkey, will send out a
reprint of Judson Welliver's article
in Munsey's magazine, dealing with
Roosevelt's record when he was pres-
ident, to be followed with other argu-
ments for the ex-president.

ROSEBUD BILL IS PASSED BY THE HOUSE

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 29.—
The homestead bill as passed by the
house reduces the time required for
proving up on all homestead entries,
requiring a residence of three years.
Amendments adopted require proof
of actual residence on the land of seven
months each year, and the con-
struction of a habitable house, and re-
lives the heirs of a deceased entryman
of residence in order to make final
proof. It now goes to conference, and
it is believed it will become a law
practically as passed by the house.

FARMERS ARE URGED TO RAISE FLAXSEED

PORTLAND, March 29.—The Port-
land Commercial Club has issued a
bulletin to the farmers of Oregon urg-
ing them to raise flaxseed. It is point-
ed out that the climate is ideal for
the successful cultivation of flax, and
that with but little trouble it can be
made a very profitable crop with no
chance of a loss, as the American Lin-
seed Oil company has guaranteed a
minimum price of \$1.25 per bushel
for all the seed and to find a market
for all the fibre. It is estimated
that Oregon will produce twelve
to fifteen bushels of the seed an acre,
and from two and a half tons of
straw, worth \$5 a ton.

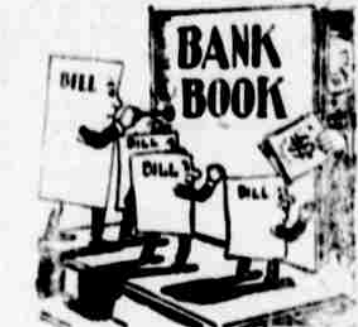
