MEDFORD MEN DISCUSS BUILDING OF RAILROAD

The Business Men and Citizens of the Hustling City Considering the Promotion of a Road to the Blue Ledge Copper Mine

MEDFORD, March 29.—Business men and citizens of Medford have called a mass meeting for Monday evening next at the Medford theater to discuss the promotion of a railroad to the Blue Ledge copper mine, thirty miles southwest of Medford.

Assurances have been received from Robt. S. Towne that he will at once erect a large concentrating plant at the mine and operate with a large payroll, provided such a railroad is built. Bond buyers agree to finance the project, providing a few miles of railroad are first constructed. Ways and means to secure the funds for construction work will be discussed at the meeting.

INDICATIONS OF GENERAL SUSPENSION COAL MINING

Efforts to adjust the differences thus far have failed.
