COURT DECLINES DOWNTOWN SITE

Spring site. Thereupon, almost a year after the court's intimation that it desired to settle this matter amicably if possible by the substitution of another site, you made the offer of block 21 in your letter of January 24. The same objection applies to block 21 as did to the Henley block, for the reason that the Henley canal runs almost through the center of half of the block, right where the court house must needs be built, and, as suggested before, it would not be good policy to construct a building with an irrigation ditch running through it. The court is informed that the city council, headed by Mr. G. W. White, has lately taken measures to remove this canal, but has failed to make any headway therein with the United States government.

"Had you accepted the court's offer and secured the Henley block under

the conditions imposed by the court, there would now be standing thereon at least the walls and roof of a fine court house building. You suggest in your letter of January 24 that you could lay a pipe in the ditch and cover it up, thus doing away with the disagreeable features connected with the Henley canal. As far as that matter is concerned, the same could have been done on the Henley block.

"The court believes that it used every possible means and gave ample time for you to secure a substitute site for that offered by the Klamath Development company, and was willing to accept any offer providing it would have been better for Klamath county to do so. You did not accept, and the court proceeded to inform you that it would act according to its best judgment.

"The court has delayed answering your letter until this time for the reason that it desired to secure the best terms it could, and suggested to the Klamath Development company that it reduce its terms relative to the amount of money to be expended in a court house building, and has secured therein a reduction from \$300,000 to \$100,000. The court believes that with this reduction the proposition of the Klamath Development company is of greater advantage to the county than the one you suggest. It would be very expensive to put block 21 in proper shape to construct a building, costing many times as much as that offered by the Klamath Development company. In your letter of January 24 you say that it would cost many thousands of dollars to grade the Hot Springs site and put it in shape for court house grounds. The court has had discussion with reputable contractors, who have offered to do the same for less than \$3,000, while the same competent authority has suggested that it would require many thousands to grade and terrace block 21, and even at that a very difficult matter to accomplish. The court therefore declines to accept your offer of January 24.

"It believes it has the power and a legal right to construct a building upon block 10 in Hot Springs addition to Klamath Falls. "Appreciating your courtesy and assuring you of our continued effort for the up-building of Klamath county in the most satisfactory and business-like way, we remain, Respectfully submitted,

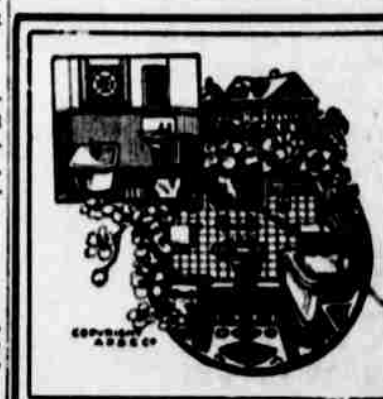
