**HOOKWORM KILLS DOCTOR
WHO MADE TESTS OF IT**

Seattle Physician Passes Away From
Result of Inoculation of Trouble
in Which He Had Made Special In-
quiry in Laboratory

SEATTLE, April 2.—Local physi-
cians are interested in the report of
Dr. Benjamin S. Paschall, who says
that Dr. John Tiedeman died here of
the hookworm disease. According to
City Health Commissioner Crichton,
but two reports of hookworm cases
have ever come to him before, and in
neither case did death result. Dr.
Tiedeman contracted the disease, it
is believed, while making laboratory
tests on the hookworm in San Fran-
cisco in 1909. He believed himself
infected with an intestinal parasite
until a few days before his death,
when both he and Dr. Paschall diag-
nosed his case as due to the hook-
worm.
