THE POLITICAL SITUATION

JOHN MOODY, the author of "The
Truth About the Trusts," recog-
nized as a truthful and fearless writ-
er upon financial affairs in this coun-
try, and who through all of the con-
centration period has maintained his
independence of Wall street control,
contributed an illuminating editorial
on the political situation to the March
number of Moody's Magazine. Mr.
Moody knows what is doing in Wall
street, and in this editorial he says:

"Since the last issue of this Maga-
zine appeared, political events of
considerable importance have oc-
curred. The presidential campaign is
now shaping up, and the spectacular
Mr. Roosevelt is once more in the
field as an active candidate. He takes
his position as the leading "insurg-
ent," pushing all other aspirants for
the candidacy aside, including his
friend, Senator La Follette, who has
done more to make the progressive
movement a possibility than all the
other "insurgents" combined.

"The announcement of Mr. Roose-
velt that he would be a candidate was
a great surprise to many people, for
he had on so many occasions insisted
and reiterated that he would not be
a candidate that the vast majority of
voters actually believed him.

"But it was no surprise to us. In
fact, ever since the Colonel took the
stand last summer in defense of the
steel corporation, it seemed clear to
us that he was at least trying to so
shape matters as to enter the canvass
this summer. While Roosevelt is a
"radical," as far as his present atti-
tude is concerned, he is at heart not a
man of profound convictions at all,
but simply a clever politician. He
saw long ago that the winning card in
1912 would probably be radicalism,
and that to win in 1912 the republi-
can candidate would have to be at
least as radical in the sentiments pro-
fessed as the democratic nominee.
Were the reverse the case, and were
a strong reactionary movement in
swing today, it may be put down as
sure as shooting that Mr. Roosevelt
would be as "conservative" as Senator
Lodge or Vice President Sherman.

"But while having due regard for
public sentiment, the Colonel is prac-
tical politician enough to know that
every campaign needs the "sineews of
war" (money chests), and that the
people's fight is seldom won unless
the candidate has the wherewithal to
pay the bills. In other words, Roose-
velt feels that to be elected president
this year it is just as important for
him to have Wall street back of him
as it was in 1904. He is convinced
that with Wall street in direct opposi-
tion, he or any other man in the re-
publican party this year would surely
go down to defeat. So, before coming
out openly for the nomination, he was
no doubt very careful to make certain
that Wall street understood him all
right, and would not oppose his can-
didacy.

"That Roosevelt is Wall street's
candidate for the presidency can
hardly admit of doubt. This fact is
no doubt being covered up as care-
fully as possible, and would be denied
in the highest quarters, but neverthe-
less, we have the strongest reasons
for believing that this is the fact.
And should Roosevelt be nominated
and elected, the truth of this will be
apparent enough in time. That Roose-
velt is going to get the best financial
backing, is already being shown down
here by the activity in behalf of his
candidacy of certain notorious pub-
licity bureaus, who have for years
been the boosters of the Belmonts,
the Morgans and other financial inter-
ests, both political and otherwise."

**DESERTER SAFE CRACKER
AND WANTS PUNISHMENT**

Lively Conscience of Adventurer
Causes Him to Give Himself Up in
the Hope That He May Do Some
Penance for Crimes Committed

SAN FRANCISCO, April 3.—Stung
by a lively conscience, Harvey S.
Sprague, safe cracker and army de-
serter, cannot rest until he has an-
swered to the law for all his mis-
deeds. Having already served a term
in the federal military prison as a
deserter, Sprague gave himself up to
the police and asked that he be sent
back to Salmon City, Idaho, to be
punished for cracking a safe three
years ago.

Sprague tells a strange story. To-
gether with a companion named Ed
Stevens, he secured \$2,000 from a
safe in the Idaho city. In January,
1910, he joined the army in St. Louis,
only to desert a few months later. In
St. Paul he ran across a Bible and
read it. Deeply repentant for his
sins he gave himself up to the army
authorities and three days ago com-
pleted a fourteen months' sentence at
Alcatraz island, San Francisco.

Upon his release Sprague joined
the Salvation Army, and again renew-
ed his study of the Bible. Now he
wants to do penance for his crime.

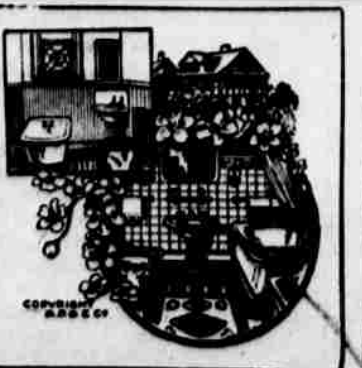
