UNITED STATES SENATOR

TWO more weeks the people of Oregon will express their choice for candidates for United States senator. Undoubtedly Dr. Harry Lane will be the democratic candidate, while the general sentiment throughout the state would indicate that the republican nomination lies between Ben Selling and Jonathan Bourne Jr. We believe that the people of Klamath and Lake counties should make their choice between Selling and Bourne, rather than waste their votes on either of the other candidates. Jonathan Bourne has practically completed his term of six years in the United States Senate, and the people of Oregon during this time have had ample time in which to judge by results whether he is the best and proper man to represent the state. If the people are satisfied with the record of Mr. Bourne, they will have no difficulty in determining for whom to cast their vote.

On the other hand, if the people of these two counties are not favorable to Senator Bourne, then it would be policy for them to support the man who stands the best show of defeating him in the nomination. From a careful study of the situation we believe that Mr. Selling is the man who can and who is going to do this. Oregon is a progressive state, and Mr. Selling has always been a sincere worker for progressive legislation. During his eight years service in the state senate, the last term of which he was honored by election as president of that body, the people of the state have grown to place the utmost confidence in his honesty, sincerity and ability, and when it became necessary for the republicans to determine on a man to make the race for the important position of United States senator, to succeed Mr. Bourne, it was but natural that Mr. Selling should at once take rank as the logical man for the place. Mr. Selling is a man of unquestioned integrity and of acknowledged business ability. For forty years he has engaged in active business here, and to him there is no state but Oregon.

The following is from a statement made in his behalf by Mark Woodruff of Portland:

"The widespread sentiment to have business men in congress is well seated in Oregon. The nation and state are but large business enterprises, needing successful business men at their heads. This article deals with a matter that is of particular importance to the people of Klamath Falls at this time, inasmuch as the voters will soon determine the system of city government by which they wished to be governed in the future. We would request our readers to consider this article carefully, and see if it would not be better for Klamath Falls to take its place in the front rank with the progressive cities of the nation, rather than to adopt a system of city government which was in vogue in this state, fifteen to twenty years ago, and which these cities are now replacing with more modern legislation.
