GAME RESOURCES

KLAMATH COUNTY has many re-
 sources, which when developed
 and used will make this section one
 of the most prosperous on the coast,
 and which will make Klamath Falls
 the second largest and important city
 in Oregon, but there is one important
 resource which should be bringing
 great wealth to the county, and which
 does not necessarily take years to de-
 velop before returns can be secured.
 This is the hunting, fishing and at-
 tractions for sportsmen and tourists.

This county is becoming known
 throughout the coast for its many
 beautiful lakes, its excellent trout
 fishing streams, its wild game and its
 abundance of ducks and geese, but
 while we have all these attractions
 for sportsmen and tourists, we should
 benefit from the experience of other
 once famous resorts whose resources
 are now depleted, and take steps
 toward protecting our game and fish
 and providing for a restocking of the
 streams and lakes, thus assuring a
 continuation of attractions to the
 sportsman.

Klamath county is fortunate in
 having a state game warden of the
 ability and progressiveness of Mr.
 Finley, who is already prejudiced in
 favor of this section, and who is ready
 and willing to give us much aid. The
 people here should take advantage of
 this opportunity, and show Mr. Fin-
 ley that they appreciate the interest
 he is taking.

We want that fish hatchery for
 Klamath county; we want more game
 birds; we want every stream in the
 county stocked with fish; we want a
 herd of elk for Crater Lake National
 Park, and probably there are a few
 other things of a like nature that we
 want, and all of these things we can
 get if a proper showing is made and
 the people of this county work as a
 body in assisting Mr. Finley and the
 state game and fish commission in
 securing them for us. Mr. Finley is
 here, and will meet all those inter-
 ested tomorrow evening, when he will
 explain some of the plans he is al-
 ready working on. This meeting
 should be attended by every business
 man, every sportsman and every citi-
 zen of Klamath Falls and the sur-
 rounding country, as the improve-
 ment of our tourist attractions means
 money to every resident of the coun-
 ty. Let every one turn out and take
 a hand in the good work.

ZUMWALT PUPILS TO GIVE RECITAL

BRILLIANT GATHERING TONIGHT AT THE OPERA HOUSE TO HEAR EFFORTS OF PROMINENT YOUNG MUSICIANS

Mrs. Don J. Zumwalt will present
 Miss Jennie Applegate and Miss Lou-
 ise Benson in a recital, the former in
 piano work and the latter in vocal
 features, at the opera house this eve-
 ning. The function will undoubtedly
 call forth one of the most brilliant
 gatherings Klamath Falls has seen
 for years, as both the young artists
 are among the most popular of the
 younger set in this city, and are
 known to be chief among the brilliant
 pupils of the gifted and cultured
 mentor.

The wide range of that tuition is
 shown in the well harmonized, and
 yet diversified nature of the pro-
 gram, which she has assigned to her
 pupils. We find the French com-
 poser Mile. Chaminade, who herself
 played her own compositions, assigned
 to Miss Benson, side by side with
 DeKoven, the American, who thrilled
 audiences of this country in the latter
 periods of the nineteenth century.
 Then comes the Austrian author,
 Josef Haydn, in the selection "My
 Mother Bids Me Bid My Hair." This
 will test the versatility of Miss Ben-
 son and afford her an opportunity to
 display her technique to the fullest
 advantage, unless the range and
 scope of her local ballad will find
 its widest range in the transforma-
 tion from tenderness to sorrow, from
 smile to tears, in an Irish folklore
 song, which very often forms the
 highest criterion, the deepest form

of fervor, and is a most critical
 burden on a vocalist. Mrs. Zumwalt,
 herself, has a rare accomplishment
 in the singing of Irish melodies, as
 her frequent singing of "Killarney"
 and "The Wearing of the Green" in
 this city has frequently demonstrated.

Miss Jennie Applegate, the cul-
 tured daughter of a brilliant family,
 will give piano selections from the
 standard composers. She will close
 the program of the recital with the
 "Menuet" from Schubert, and a "Ro-
 mance" from Rubenstein. Mrs. Zum-
 walt has certainly set a wide task to
 her two pupils, but it would seem as
 if, in the case of Miss Applegate, she
 has subjected her to too much Beeth-
 oven. It may seem an audacious as-
 sumption, but it is a protes-
 tant of the best critics
 of the day, that
 George Bernard Shaw, one of the most
 brilliant living men in literature and art,
 once used the phrase, "Beethoven,
 burly and cheaply chaotic." But if a
 pianist can inject into the work what
 the author did not, then all credit be-
 longs to the instrumentalist, and for
 that reason Miss Applegate's three
 selections from the "chaotic" selec-
 tions of Beethoven will be listened to
 critically and attentively.
