THE TOWN ROW

IT WAS plain at the Chamber of Commerce meeting the other night that the sentiment of the membership was very much opposed to the continuation of the fight which has been made over the possible change in site of the county court house.

It is gratifying to see such feelings manifested.

It would be additionally gratifying and a cause for congratulation for a long time to come if this fuss could be stopped.

The best way to stop the trouble may not be easy to determine, but it is very certain that if it is to be abated in short order, without a great deal more acrimony, some conciliatory measures will have to be adopted. Much of the policy of the antagonists on the proposition has been, up to this time, that wherever a cranium showed above the ramparts of the enemy, the proper thing was to smite it boldly and with a powerful swat—a sleep-punch, as it were.

Of course, an uninterrupted policy of struggle to overthrow the other fellow would be won by somebody in time, by the right side, probably, with fair means, and by the wrong side with foul. But in the meantime it is costing, possibly, as much in an indirect way, as the alleged expense to taxpayers which is liable to follow if the court house is moved.

People abroad know that the fight is on, therefore they shun the town in many cases where they would otherwise come in with their means or themselves and help it grow. The idea of trying, as certain local interests have tried, to keep the skeleton hidden in the closet and prevent its rattle from becoming audible to the ears of the outsider, is probably well meant, but it will not help much.

There are powerful interests on both sides. Each may have some degree of merit to its argument, but both cannot be victors. In case of keeping up the scrap somebody's side must lose and, generally speaking, everybody has already lost something through the reflex action arising out of the miserable mess.

Conciliation might be well worth considering.

Since the Chamber of Commerce wants the row stopped, maybe the Commercial club would be willing to have it stopped, too. This is not suggesting that either organization drop its dignity and its boxing gloves. The latter can be laid aside and the former remain unruffled while some overture toward a pacific settlement of the trouble is under contemplation.

In order to do this some one must make the first break toward arbitration. It will not be to the discredit, but to the honor, of the one who does it, whether the effort avail or not.

Who will be the Moses to lead Klamath county out of the wilderness of bitterness?

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
