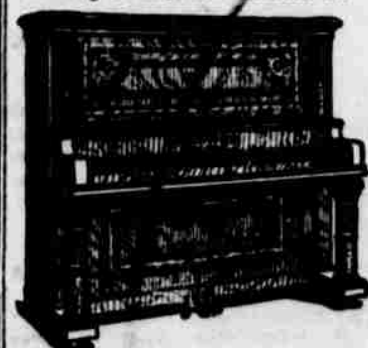

**SENATE STORM CLOUDS
OVER INCOME TAX BILL**

Members of Body Say Bill Has All the
Objections Which a Truly Income
Tax Bill Would Have Now, and
They Are "Agha" It.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 11.—
Storm clouds are gathering in the
senate for the reception to be given
the income tax bill passed by the
house and now in the hands of the
senate finance committee.

Senators declare that it falls far
short of the bill that will be passed
when the income tax amendment to
the constitution is adopted. The
amendment has received the endorse-
ment of thirty states, and it is con-
fidently believed, that the six states
needed for its complete ratification
will be in line within a year.

Evidence of the feeling toward the
measure by a number of senators was
forcefully stated by a prominent
member of the senate, who said:

"This bill has all the legal objec-
tions that a truly income tax bill
would have at this time. Of course,
an attempt will be made to justify the
bill in a legal sense by the supreme
court decision on the corporation tax.

"That decision sustained the valid-
ity of the tax on the proposition that
the capacity to do business as corpo-
rations was such an advantage to those
who enjoyed it that they could be
charged a special tax.

"Now this bill covers the doing of
business of any kind by an individual
or otherwise, a vested right. In prac-
tice it is but a direct tax on indi-
viduals.

**ABOLISH CORNS IN ARMY;
WAR SECRETARY'S TASK**

New Type of Shoes, Slightly Altered
and Less Oiled, Being Tried out
With Hope of Reducing Pains in
Feet of Soldiers

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 11.—
Experiments to abolish corns from
the feet of Uncle Sam's soldier boys
are being made by direction of Sec-
retary of War Stimson.

A new type of shoe for the mili-
tary service is being developed in the
interest of increased efficiency and
comfort of the soldiers. An "Army
Shoe Board" has been ordered to con-
vent at Fort Leavenworth, Kans.

where preliminary tests with various
types of shoes have been held. An
order has been placed with the shoe
factory to make 100 pairs of the new
experimental type for the test dem-
onstrations. Maj. William J. Glas-
gow has been assigned to superintend
the manufacture.

Slight alterations to the broad
shape of the toes of the present army
shoes are recommended in the ex-
perimental shoes. Less oil in the
leather is another innovation to be
tried.

The shoes will be made in three
styles, for garrison and marching ser-
vice, and tried out upon members of
the Seventh Infantry. A march of
112 miles will be the final supreme
test of the new shoes.
