Forest Grove Man is Strongly Endorsed for Republican Nomination for Dairy and Food Overseer as the Man for the Job

PRESIDENT'S WORK NOW UNDERSTOOD

Criticism Gives Way to Appreciation When His Deeds are Known.

After three years of patient, steadfast, patriotic performance, President Taft is at last coming into his own. Misunderstandings, that clouded his administration, are being swept away. Those who will follow his work with open mind must agree that his has been a term of constructive statesmanship, when progressive legislation and principles have been fostered and encouraged.

Why there ever should have come a cloud of misunderstanding between President Taft and the people is hard to explain. One writer says: "Perhaps it was because we lived in the period of the crusader. The appeal had been entirely to the public conscience and the public ear was attuned to the crash of the battle hymn of the republic. Righteous peace has succeeded an equally righteous war."

When one looks back over the accomplishments of President Taft's first three years in office, one is astounded that generous recognition did not come sooner. Absolute conviction must come to those who examine his performances.

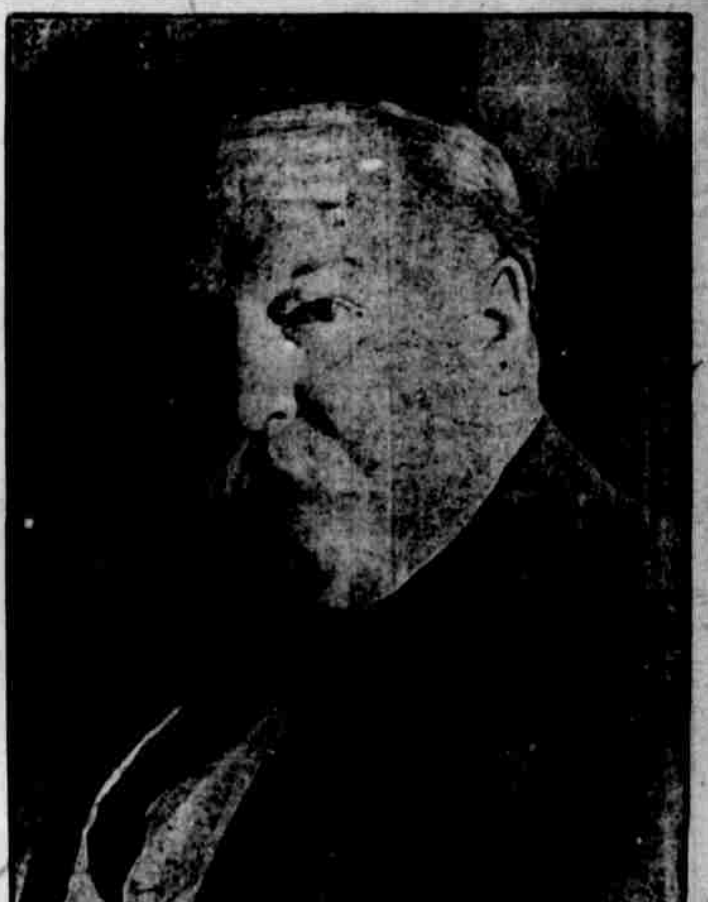
Championed Cause of Toller.

The cause of the toller has found in President Taft its most impartial champion, resulting in the creation of

revision measure, which departed from the principles laid down by the republican party and approved by the American people at the election of 1908, namely, that future revisions should be based on accurate information painstakingly gathered by men who would seek the truth without regard to political consequences. The information was not at hand when the congress passed the bill in question, and without hesitation, without any regard or fear for the threatened disastrous effect on his own political fortunes, President Taft returned the bill to the capitol with messages of his disapproval.

The tariff board has been made an effective instrument for good under his administration and justified its existence by the comprehensive report on the wool industry made to congress, under the guidance of which it will be possible to determine the difference between the cost of production at home and abroad, and to give the people a measure revising the wool schedule, which will leave but little to guesswork and uncertainty and take the question out of the hands of the log-rollers, whose methods have long been an element of danger and disgrace in the administration of the revenues of the government. The national law-making body, thanks to the unswerving efforts of President Taft, can now approach the task fully equipped to carry it to an intelligent conclusion.

Works For World-Wide Peace. To the chapter of President Taft's international activities, all of which have made for his lasting fame and have added to the prestige of the United States in the field of diplomatic achievement, several of the most

a Bureau of Mines, the widening of the scope of the safety appliance act, the enactment of the boiler inspection law, the onward march of the principle of workmen's compensation and employers' liability.

President Taft's masterful disposition of the trust question has made for industrial reorganization and commercial prosperity. It took 44 prosecutions to do it—prosecutions of the American Sugar Refining company, the Imperial Window Glass company, the National Packing company, the Armour Packing company, the General Electric company, the trans-Atlantic steamship pool, the Eastern States Retail Lumber Dealers' Association, the naval-stores trust, the United States Steel corporation. But it established the supremacy of the law and put the fear of it into the hearts of the men who controlled the great corporations which theretofore had been a law and a world unto themselves.

Bringing the Standard Oil and the Tobacco trust cases to a successful issue, the decisions handed down in those great causes by the supreme court of the United States marked an epoch in the history of the nation and defined the code of commercial ethics to which the big business of the country began immediately to conform. Sworn to carry into execution the laws of the country, as well as to uphold its constitution, President Taft made no distinctions. Indictments, arrests, prosecutions and convictions marked his steadfast course. The record of his achievements is written large in the activities of the department of justice in the decisions of the courts.

Yook Taft out of Politics.

Pursuing the same steadfast policy with regard to the promised revision of the tariff, President Taft visited the promised free list, wool and steel

important paragraphs must be added. The universal movement for international peace found its original impetus in the submission by President Taft of the treaties with Great Britain and France, providing for the arbitration of all disputed questions, including those of vital interest and national honor. The leading civilized countries of the world have ungrudgingly acknowledged the altruistic principle underlying the propaganda, of which the president has become the high priest and the peace-loving people of the world have arisen to call him blessed.

The denunciation of the Russian-American treaty was a diplomatic achievement of the highest order, more especially because the discussion of the passport question had become so bitter as to affect the judgment of the house of representatives, which approached the matter in a way well calculated to bring the two nations to the verge of a disagreeable international incident.

In the Mexican incident he again showed high qualities of statesmanship, demonstrating to the world not only the readiness for actual service of the military branch of the government, as indicated by maneuvers along the Mexican border, but also the willingness of this government to assume the responsibilities devolving upon it with relation to disturbed conditions in neighboring countries. And yet the entire program, full of dangers and menacing possibilities, was executed with a fine regard for the sensibilities of our neighbors to the south, and, despite the mischievous rumors naturally circulating at the time, left Mexico more than ever convinced of the friendship and good faith of this country.
