CHAMBERLAIN ASKS FOR OREGON'S SHARE

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 13.—Senator Chamberlain is a member of the subcommittee of the committee on agriculture which has the agricultural appropriation bill before it. He is interested in securing, if possible, reasonable appropriations for the road across the Cascade mountains from Western to Eastern Oregon; in retaining the full appropriation originally suggested for the protection of national forests from fire, in which many organizations in Oregon are deeply interested; in the Crater Lake national road system, as recommended by the government engineers; in the item for the publication of colored plates of standard varieties of fruits.

The senator will make a fight for all of these items and hopes to be able to convince his associates of their importance.

GENERAL GRANT DIES IN EAST OF HEART FAILURE

Commander of Department of East, and Son of Famous Soldier-President, Feared Same Growth That Killed Parent

NEW YORK, April 13.—Major General Frederick Dent Grant, commander of the Eastern Division of the United States Army, and son of General Ulysses S. Grant, died early yesterday as a result of heart failure.

It is believed his end was hastened by the fear that a cancerous growth of the tongue, for which he was operated on Wednesday night, was similar to that which killed his father. He was born May 29, 1856, and served in the Spanish war in the Philippines. He was minister to Vienna under President Harrison.

USE NATRON CUTOFF, EUGENE TO OAKRIDGE

EUGENE, April 13.—D. W. Campbell, superintendent of the Oregon lines of the Harriman system, accompanied by other officials, made a trip on a special train over the new Natron extension to Oakridge yesterday, presumably preparatory to its acceptance from the contractors. It is understood that the line will within the next few days be turned over to the operating department, and that train service between Eugene and Oakridge will be established.

It is also understood that the officials looked into the matter of extending the Portland-Eugene local passenger train to Springfield, and that of extending the East Side branch local train, which now stops at Springfield, to Eugene. The people of Springfield have petitioned for the change of the Eugene local and the people of Coburg have asked for the change of the Springfield train.

CHANGE PLAN OF THE JUSTICE COURT

New Bill Projected Promises to Do Away With the Use of Lawyers in Justice Court—Simple Rules to Govern Such Proceedings

PORTLAND, April 13.—A simplified Justice's court procedure where all obsolete proceedings are done away with and a case can be heard merely upon the presentation of a bill to the court, is the plan outlined in a proposed law which is to go on the November ballot.

Initiative petitions are now being prepared for placing the new law on the November ballot. The proposed simplified procedure makes radical changes which promise to do away with the use of lawyers in the Justice's court.

There are only two requirements to put a case at issue under the simplified Justice's rules. First, the presentation of a bill to the court. Second, the issuing of a summons by the clerk of the court requiring the defendant to appear within seven days. At this stage of the case both parties come before the court and tell their side of the question, under direction of the judge without hindrance by technical rules of evidence.

All pleadings, such as complaints, demurrers, motions, answers and replies are done away with; the jurisdiction of the court is enlarged from \$250 to \$500.

Appeals can be had on amounts over \$50. At the present time appeals can be taken on amounts as low as \$10. When an appeal is taken the clerk of the court is required to supply all blanks necessary for the appeal, fill out the bond for the interested party, prepare and serve notice on the adverse party, prepare transcript of the proceedings and file the same with the circuit court. In event of a technical error the party against whom it is raised has the privilege of correcting the same without destroying or affecting his appeal in any way. The judge is given the power to act as an official after court hours for the convenience of those who cannot appear before the judge during the day time.

Present abuses of the use of attachments and garnishments are eliminated by giving the justice the power to inquire into defendant's ability to pay a judgment of the court. If it is found that he cannot pay the entire bill an order can be entered by the court permitting the bill to be paid in weekly or monthly installments. During the paying period the plaintiff in the case is not permitted to harass the defendant with further garnishments or other proceedings.

The proposed simplified procedure is a set of rules made plain and simple so that any person of average understanding can present his own case to the court. It is designed to eliminate the present technical pleadings which take up so much time of the court and interested parties and stop present excessive court costs and attorneys' fees.

Attorney Harry Yankwich, one of the republican candidates for judge of the justice court, is author of the new law. Mr. Yankwich is now or-

ganizing a league for the purpose of presenting the new measure to the voters at the next general election, to be held in November.

William Beattie Nesbitt, former member of Canadian parliament, is held at Chicago, charged with wrecking the Farmers' Bank of Toronto, and getting away with \$250,000. The police believe the accused has over \$100,000 hidden in Chicago.

FOUNDER OF RED CROSS SOCIETY PASSES AWAY

Miss Clara Barton, Nationally Prominent in Relief Work for Many Years, Dies at Age Past 90 Years, After Lingering Illness

WASHINGTON, April 13.—Miss Clara Barton, founder of the National Red Cross movement, died at her home in Glen Echo, Maryland, yesterday. She had been ill for months.

Clara Barton was more than 90 years of age. She was born at Oxford, Mass. in 1821. She first became nationally prominent in the Civil War, when she participated in and directed relief work on the battlefields. After the war she was associated with the International Red Cross of Geneva, and served in relief work of the Franco-Prussian war. She organized the National Red Cross in this country in 1881, being its president until she resigned in 1904. She served on the field in the Spanish war.
