REVOLUTIONARY PLOT AGAINST GUATEMALA

Aide to Chief Executive of That Country, Recently in Los Angeles in Disguise, Says That Junta Is There Recruiting Men

LOS ANGELES, April 16.—Revelation of an alleged plot to recruit men in California to engage in a revolutionary expedition against President Estrada Cabrera of Guatemala is made here by Colonel L. Alexis de Clairmont, aide to the Guatemalan chief executive, who has been in Los Angeles incognito for several weeks. "I am in possession of facts," said Colonel de Clairmont, "that prove a revolutionary junta to be at work. These men have endeavored to recruit 500 men here to join a similar number at New Orleans. All their expenses and \$1 per day were to have been paid the volunteers."

Manning-Henderson Charter Reactionary. According to AUSTAD Editor Herald:
I believe you, Mr. Editor, and the majority of your readers, have observed that those nations where the common people have the most say, or where the law-making power is nearest to the people, are the most enlightened and progressive of all civilized nations.

On the other hand, those countries where the ruling power is in the hands of the few are the most backward and in all respects the most undesirable to live in. If that be true, then it follows that a law or city charter which tends to bring the right to rule closer to the people is good, and in keeping with a progressive people, while one which takes the right to rule away from the people and rests it in the hands of a few—such a law or city charter is reactionary, and unsuited to a progressive people. The proposed charter which is now being distributed among the people of this community to be voted on in a few days must be put in the last mentioned or reactionary class. I have tried to study it for some days past. It is anything but interesting reading to the average citizen so I am afraid some of the voters will not read it through as carefully as they should, and perhaps there be some who will throw it away after reading a few pages. I wish to urge all voters to study that charter carefully, even though it be a disagreeable task. Take a day off, if necessary, to do so, for if adopted it may be the foundation for our city government for years to come.

But for the benefit of those who may not have the inclination to do so, I will point out a few of its objectionable features, and I will leave it to the mayor's friends to point out the good ones—if any there be.

On page 87 you will find that the council may decide to change the grade of any street in the city. After having decided on such changes and posted notices to that effect, the people living along the same street, or who would be affected by such changes, have twenty days in which to file a remonstrance. But the council may overrule such remonstrance and proceed with the work, and charge the cost to the property owners. By reading a little further you will find that the council has the power to lay out, vacate, close or alter any streets in the city, and to appropriate and condemn private property which may be in the way. You will also find that ten freeholders living in ANY PART OF THE CITY can petition the mayor and council for any kind of improvement in any other part of the city, be it paving, macadamizing or anything else, and if it is agreeable to the mayor and council they can order the preliminary surveys made. After that a period of fifteen days must elapse, in which time the residents along said street or highway to be improved or those who would have to foot the bill, can have the pleasure of getting up a remonstrance, but again the council can overrule such remonstrance, go ahead with the work as if nothing had happened, and assess the cost against the property holders.

If this becomes the law of this city all the mayor needs is ten friends outside of the council—(and perhaps even the present mayor has that many). He can then, with the cooperation of the council, do anything he likes in the way of street improvement inside of the city, regardless of the wishes of the property owners. The mayor and council can decide on what sort of pavements shall be used on our streets; what price to be paid for same, and who should have the contract to do it. Perhaps his honor would like to let more such contracts as he did to the Strange-Maguire company last year, whose bid for the work, according to records, was \$17,000 higher than Ransome, Crumney company; which company also offered to lay a concrete foundation under the surface pavement and guarantee the work for five years. But perhaps the mayor had good hard reasons for giving the contract to the Strange-Maguire company.

If this charter is voted in and Mayor Sanderson elected for two years more, we may expect to see many such contracts let, and all the taxpayers will have to do is to keep their mouths shut, pay the bill, and say they like it.

How do you like the prospects of such an arrangement, Mr. Voter? It is an old saying that a chain is only as strong as its weakest link, and likewise a charter is only as good as its most autocratic provision. I hope your readers will look up those pages I have mentioned, digest them thoroughly, and then vote as their conscience dictates.
