FACTS AND PROGRESSION

BECAUSE reference is made to the proposed new charter under the name of the Sanderson charter, the opponents of said measure are accused of personalities. Such accusations are probably made with the object and hope of making the coming special election a personal issue, and thus prevent the careful consideration of the provisions of the new charter. It is hoped to distract the attention of the voters from this measure by starting a row or agitation over something foreign to the case, such as the fire-department row or a split between the mayor and some of his councilmen.

More than half a page is devoted to what purports to be an argument in favor of the Sanderson charter, and we leave it to the people of the city if there is one FACT in the entire harangue that can, by the greatest stretch of the imagination, be construed into a sane argument showing the advantage of the new measure over the old charter.

It seems to be an admitted fact that the only proper system of government for Klamath Falls is the Commission Form. This is the only form of charter that represents real progress. If it is progress that Mr. Evans wants, how can he consistently advocate a measure that is retrogression in its most positive form.

Klamath Falls is a progressive and rapidly developing city, and yet the voters are asked to adopt a measure compiled from charters which were adopted by such cities as Portland, Salem, Roseburg and Ashland from fifteen to twenty years ago, and which these cities are now discarding for more modern laws. Is this PROGRESS or RETROGRESSION? These laws may have been amply sufficient for that day and age, but Klamath Falls does not want to begin where these cities started twenty years ago. Our city should be able to profit from the experience of other cities, and if we are to adopt a new city government, it should be such as is approved by the most progressive and modern cities in the United States.

Here is an example of facts as it oozes from the brain of our morning contemporary: If: "If we turn it down we are still a bankrupt city, without credit in the financial world and operating under a charter decried by attorneys to be without legal force and under which we cannot sell bonds." We would like to have Mr. Evans verify these so-called facts. Will he kindly name one of the attorneys who has DECLARED that the present charter is illegal? Is it true that we cannot sell bonds under this charter? How about the \$45,000 worth of sewer bonds that were sold and accepted by the bond company after a most rigid examination of their legality by their attorneys.

Mr. Evans may not be an attorney, but we believe that he knows that in case the old charter is illegal, then the new charter, if adopted, would be in exactly the same condition. If it is impossible to sell bonds under the present charter, it will be just as impossible to sell bonds under the Sanderson charter. The Sanderson charter was ordained by the city council, and was submitted under the provisions of the old charter. If the old charter is not a legal instrument, then the city council, elected under its provisions, is not a legal body, and has not legal authority or right to submit any measure or charter for adoption. We cannot believe that Mr. Evans is ignorant of these FACTS and if he is right in our conclusion then he is willfully attempting to deceive the voters of Klamath Falls for the sole purpose of securing votes for the new charter. It pays to be honest in your dealings with the public, particularly if you are in the newspaper business.

If Klamath Falls had a dozen charters, authorizing ten million dollars' worth of bonds, it is ridiculous to believe that we can dispose of more than the property security will justify. Some people seem to think that all that is necessary in order to sell bonds is to have a provision in the charter authorizing the people to vote them. Bond companies, however, are rather particular, and they always carefully investigate the security as

well as the legality of the charter and bond election.

We do not believe that any company would buy bonds of the city of Klamath Falls, at the present time, in excess of the present limit. It is all right to talk of issuing bonds and paying them off in twenty years, but it must not be forgotten that the interest on these bonds MUST be paid every six months; also, a certain amount has to be set aside in the sinking fund each year to redeem these bonds. The interest on \$200,000 indebtedness at 6 per cent is \$12,000. It will be necessary to lay aside \$10,000 each year for the sinking fund. Here is \$22,000 that MUST be raised each year, and in addition to this the city has to pay the regular running expenses, which is in the neighborhood of \$15,000. This makes an annual expense of over

\$30,000, while our revenue is about \$24,000. It will take more than a new charter to raise this deficiency, and there is no business in any argument advocating increasing the bonded indebtedness under these conditions, as once the city is compelled to refuse payment of its interest, its credit is worthless, and no company would consider buying its bonds.
