OREGON IMPORTS EGGS BY MILLIONS FROM EAST

Local Production Will Be Encouraged
by Oregon Agricultural College,
Which Issues Bulletins on Hen
Fruit and Prize Porkers.

CORVALLIS, April 17.—The exten-
sion division of the Oregon Agricul-
tural College has just published two
new leaflets, one by Professor E. J.
Poter of the animal husbandry de-
partment on "Prize-Winning Pigs for
Oregon Boys," and the other by Prof.
James Dryden of the poultry depart-
ment, on Oregon Boys and Girls and
the Egg Problem.

The extension division is making
an effort to interest the boys of the
state in raising "mortgage lifters,"
to increase the meat supply and re-
duce the amount which must now be
imported from other states. The as-
sistance of a Portland stock yards
company was given in the issuance of
50,000 copies of the bulletin, to be
distributed among the school boys. It
describes methods of breeding, fat-
tening, caring for and marketing
swine.

The second bulletin is issued also
in 50,000 copies with the assistance
of the Portland Commercial Club.
Since in the past year 2,293,200 doz-
en eggs have been imported from
states east of the Rocky Mountains
the college feels it necessary to in-
crease local production of this com-
modity as well as of dressed poultry,
of which twenty carloads were ship-
ped in last year. It was decided to
interest the boys and girls in the egg
problem, and encourage them to add
to the state's wealth in this manner.

These leaflets are a part of the
campaign of industrial contests for
Oregon boys and girls. The state
fair prizes for pigs raised by Oregon
boys includes. For the best pig in
Class A, a Poland China boar, given
by Thos. Carmichael, Gaston, breed-
er of Poland China pigs; Holstein cat-
tle and Shropshire sheep; and in
Class B, for the best pig, a Hamp-
shire pig given by J. Pruitts, Joseph
A. grand special for a sow and litter
has as first prize a Shetland pony
from the Union Meat company, Port-
land, and as a second prize a Poland
China boar from P. E. Thompson,
Maple Lawn stock farm. At the coun-
ty fairs other prizes will be offered
the boys for pigs.

Poultry prizes are numerous. Sec-
retary of State Olcott will give a Shet-
land pony for the best trio of chick-
ens, and Eugene Prescott, Salem, will
offer a special prize in the same class
of 100 Faverolle eggs from his prize
Salmon Faverolles. For the best trio
in the American class, including Ply-
mouth Rocks, Dominiques, Wyand-
ottes and Rhode Island Reds, the
first prize is a trio of Buff Plymouth
Rocks from B. F. Williams, Milton;
second, a trio of Rhode Island Reds
from L. B. Frye, Ontario; third, 30
eggs from Mr. Williams Buff Rocks.
In Class B, first prize will be a trio
of silver laced Wyandottes from Mrs.
Frank Lines, Albany; second, a trio
of Rhode Island Reds from B. I. Fer-
guson, Salem; and third, 30 eggs
from Mr. Williams.

In the Mediterranean class, includ-
ing Leghorns, Black Spanish, Minors,
Anconas and Andalusians, the
three Class A prizes are: First, a
120-egg incubator from E. J. McClan-
ahan, Eugene; second, a trio of Brown
Leghorns, A. G. Probst, Albany; third
a Blue Andalusian cockerel from D.
M. Galbreath, Monmouth. In Class
B, a fireless brooder from Mr. Mc-
Clanahan is first prize; a trio of sin-
gle comb White Leghorns from C. O.
Windle, Lents, second and an Ancona
cockerel from Mr. Probst the third.

Fourteen other prizes will also be
awarded at the State Fair for chick-
ens and ducks in different classes.
For the best trio of ducks in Class A,
J. H. Engeman, Silverton, will give
three Indian Runner ducks, and for
the best Class B, Charles A. Muths,
Salem, will give a like trio. For the
best exhibit in the miscellaneous sec-
tion, including games, bantams, Pol-
ish and other fowl, the Northwest
Poultry Journal, Salem, will give a
library of five poultry books; for sec-
ond prize, B. M. Smith, Aurora, a trio
of games, and for third, Dr. M. E. De
Guire, Silverton, 30 fine eggs. In
Class B the first prize will be a trio
of single comb Buff Leghorns, from
B. H. Moul, McMinnville; second, a
trio of white-faced Black Spanish
from E. H. Hufford, St. Johns, and
third, 30 eggs from fine Plymouth
Rocks, given by Dr. M. E. De Guire,
Silverton.

Six prizes offered in the English
class and for Asiatics and Hamburgs
are as follows: Class A, three Buff
Orpingtons, from W. I. Goin, Seap-
ooping; second, three pure bred se-
lected fowls from B. M. Smith, Cam-
poo; third, book on soils, Pacific
Homestead, and three more in Class
B.

ATTACK ON KING CAUSE OF CHARITABLE WAVE

king's escape, people from all over
Italy are now daily sending large
sums of money to the king and Queen
Elena to be used by them in whatever
charitable manner they may choose.

In a way this rather remarkable
manifestation is a result of the char-
itable work done in Italy by Queen
Elena. The latter was formerly the
Princess Helen of Montenegro, and at
first was rather coldly received by the
Italian people. Since then she has
endeavored herself to the entire na-
tion, not only by her own personal
charity work, but by her constant ef-
fort to arouse the rather indifferent
women of the Roman aristocracy into
active efforts in behalf of the poor.

CONSUMPTION CONGRESS WITH YANKEES LEADING

Formal Opening of International Tu-
berculosis Organization Has Large
Number of Delegates From United
States

ROME, April 17.—With the formal
opening yesterday of the Seventh In-
ternational Tuberculosis congress,
delegates are present both in quan-
tity and quality sufficient to insure
that the United States will easily play
the leading part in the congress, the
first that has been held since that of
1908 at Washington, D. C.

The congress will last until April
20, and will be participated in by
delegates from practically every civil-
ized country in the world. The United
States, however, has the largest for-
eign representation present.

Dr. Webb of Colorado Springs has
been chosen to deliver the general re-
port on behalf of the entire United
States. Other Americans will then
give addresses and reports. Nathan
Strauss of New York will lead their
papers with "Protection of Babies in
America from Tuberculosis."
