LUMBER LASTING--**

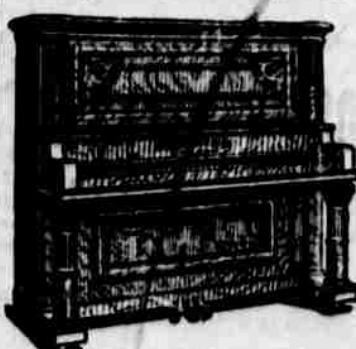
Why, it is about as durable as

THE CHARTER DEBATE

ONE TO read the Northwestern of
this morning's issue, if he were
a stranger, would be led to believe
that there were no arguments, of any
importance, presented before the
meeting at the court house last even-
ing when the proposed new charter
was discussed, except that of Samuel
M. Evans, editor of the Northwestern.
He even stole all the glory from his
co-speaker, City Attorney Manning.
Mr. Manning is recognized as a very
brilliant man, and one of the best
public speakers and debaters in
Klamath Falls, yet in his egotism Mr.
Evans gives about a dozen lines to
Mr. Manning's argument, and devotes
half a column to his own speech,
which is quoted, as, perhaps, he had
it committed to memory.

The Northwestern may fool a num-
ber of people who were not present
at last night's meeting as to what
actually occurred, but personally, we
would not care to jeopardize our in-
tegrity among the 150 or more citi-
zens who were present, by such a mis-
representation of facts and biased re-
port as appeared in the news columns
of the Northwestern. The news col-
umns of a paper should be free from
bias or prejudice, and should be as
complete as possible. It should contain
a fair presentation of actual occur-
rences, for the newspaper that will
permit its news articles to be col-
ored and distorted to meet the per-
sonal views of its management will
soon lose the confidence of its read-
ers.

The meeting arranged for last even-
ing was to have been a debate on
the merits of the proposed Sanderson
charter, with Mr. Manning and Mr.
Evans taking the affirmative and Mr.
Elder and Mr. Smith handling the
negative side. This would have given
the affirmative the opening and
closing argument, but when the time
for the meeting arrived the support-
ers of the proposed charter failed to
appear, and A. E. Elder and W. O.
Smith proceeded to present their side
of the question. At the conclusion
John Dequer, the socialist organizer,
addressed the meeting, and when he
was nearly through and the meeting
about ready to adjourn, Mr. Manning
and Samuel M. Evans arrived on the
scene with the excuse that they had
been unavoidably detained. This
was shortly before 9 o'clock. Through
the courtesy of the chairman of the
meeting they were permitted to pre-
sent their arguments in support of
the charter.

As they had not heard the argu-
ments of the first speakers, they
could not reply to these or make any
explanation, so that it was impossible
that "Smith's contentions were
knocked down one by one at last
night's meeting," as reported in the
news columns of the Northwestern.
Mr. Elder made a very able presenta-
tion of the legal defects and provi-
sions of the proposed Sanderson
charter, and not one of these contentions
was refuted or touched on by the op-
position. In fact, it was evident that
Mr. Manning and Mr. Evans resorted
to unfair methods in coming in after
the other speakers had exhausted the
time allowed them, and attempted to
bluff the audience by bold statements,
purporting to be facts, which they
knew the other side would have no
opportunity to deny or that they
would be compelled to prove.

FOR 36,136 HORSEPOWER, ON
McKENZIE RIVER**

SALEM, April 18—That the waters
of Clear Lake and the McKenzie River
afford opportunity for the develop-
ment of tremendous power is under-
stood by those who are familiar with
them. It is on these waters that the
Southern Pacific Railroad company
made filings a few days ago, presuma-
bly for the purpose of electrifying

the company's lines between Portland
and San Francisco.
The Southern Pacific company has
filed on 400 second feet of the waters
of the McKenzie, and propose to build
a canal 4 1/2 miles long, which will
produce falls 795 feet high, and en-
able the company to generate 36,136
horsepower.
