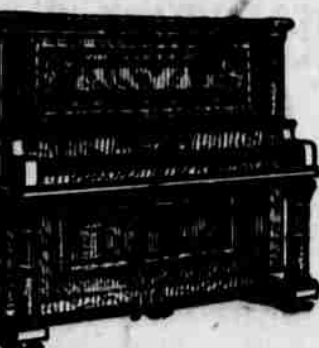

**WHO WILL INVESTIGATE THE  
MAYOR?**

**W**ITH reference to the power of  
 the mayor, under the proposed  
 new charter, to interfere with the  
 duties and suspend other elective  
 officers of the city, it would be well  
 for the voters to read both sections  
 10 and 11, so that they will be able  
 to judge of the extent of this power.  
 "Section 10.—The mayor may at  
 any time, with or without notice, in-  
 vestigate in person or through one  
 or more competent persons appointed  
 by him for the purpose, the offices  
 and accounts of any department of  
 the city or of any employee, and the  
 official acts and conduct of any offi-  
 cial or employee in the administrative  
 service of the city, and the money, se-  
 curities and property belonging to the  
 city in the possession or charge of  
 such department, officer or employee.  
 "Section 11.—The mayor shall have  
 power to suspend, pending an official  
 investigation, any officer of the city,  
 except councilmen, for any official de-  
 fault or wilful neglect of duty or  
 official misconduct."

There should be no objection to a  
 proper investigation of the actions,  
 books and accounts of any official of  
 the city, and any honest official who  
 was doing his duty would be only too  
 glad of any investigation at any time,  
 but the mayor is not the proper man  
 to make such an investigation, or to  
 whom should be given the power of  
 suspension. The only proper body to  
 order an investigation is the city  
 council. The members of that body  
 are the ones who should be given the  
 power to investigate any officer at any  
 time, and also to suspend any officer,  
 even including the mayor, pending  
 such official investigation, if it should  
 be deemed necessary.

It can readily be seen that a mayor  
 who might be antagonistic to the po-  
 lice judge, could so humiliate that  
 officer as to force him to resign, and  
 would thereby be permitted to fill this  
 important elective office with some  
 particular friend. On the other hand  
 a mayor and police judge, if they  
 were so disposed, could so combine  
 that they could work great injury to  
 the city. Experience in other cities  
 where too much power is placed in  
 the hands of one or two men has re-  
 sulted in hundreds of cities, you  
 might say, in great loss by graft. We  
 are unable to find anything in the  
 new charter that would permit the  
 people of the city or the city council  
 from questioning the acts of the  
 officials or making an investigation of  
 their records and books.

OF TURKISH LOYALTY**

Since Aeroplanes Cut Figure in De-  
 fence of Country Allegiance In-  
 cludes Faith Above Ground, Too.

**CONSTANTINOPLE, April 19.**—  
 With the advent of aeroplanes and  
 airships, Turkey has had to remodel  
 its oath of allegiance for the Turkish  
 soldiers. Heretofore the soldiers  
 have sworn to be true and faithful  
 to the sultan on "land and water."  
 At the swearing in of 400 new officers  
 which have been promoted, the oath  
 had been brought up to date: "I  
 swear to be true and faithful to the  
 padishah on land and water and in  
 the air."

**MUCH ROAD WORK NEEDED  
TO IMPROVE THE COUNTRY**

To Make National System Efficient,  
 According to Agricultural Secre-  
 tary, \$2,000,000,000 Must Be Ex-  
 pended

**W**ASHINGTON, D. C., April 22.—  
 Three hundred thousand miles of  
 roadway must be improved before the  
 road system of the United States can  
 be considered efficient, according to  
 information just made public by Sec-  
 retary of Agriculture Wilson. The  
 improvement will involve an expendi-  
 ture of approximately \$2,000,-  
 000,000.

It is pointed out by the secretary  
 that the roads have long been neg-  
 lected by both state and federal au-  
 thorities, and that only in recent  
 years has the "good road movement"  
 gained in force. The consequences  
 of the delay are shown by the fact  
 that there now but 190,476 miles of  
 "modern" highways in the United  
 States, or about 8.66 per cent of the  
 total mileage of all public roads, im-  
 proved or unimproved.

While the amount necessary to re-  
 pair the roads, so that traffic can be  
 moved throughout the country, with  
 only a minimum wear and tear seems  
 to be fabulously large, it is to be taken  
 into consideration that the cost is to  
 be divided among the various states,  
 and therefore reduced proportionately.

New York state has bonded itself  
 to expend \$5,000,000 annually on  
 the improvement of its highways, and  
 it is hoped that other states will fol-  
 low until the movement becomes na-  
 tional. New York also leads the  
 states making the greatest progress  
 in road building. Georgia is second;  
 South Carolina third; Alabama is  
 fourth, and Florida is fifth. Experi-  
 ments made in these states have clearly  
 demonstrated that sand-clay high-  
 ways can be constructed cheaply, and  
 give general satisfaction.

**Chiloquin Train**  
 The Southern Pacific will run a  
 special train from Klamath Falls to  
 Chiloquin on Saturday, April 20, to  
 accommodate people attending the  
 circus. The train will leave Klamath  
 Falls about 8 p. m. The train will  
 make the regular trip to Chiloquin,  
 and will serve to bring people in from

**Says Recall Is Meeting With Success**  
 Evening Herald:

Mr. H. F. Murdoch returned from  
 the recall petition campaign with the  
 assurance that the recall petition is a  
 popular movement. The trio that  
 went to Bonanza recently were ad-  
 vised that such a meeting was to  
 take place. The hall was rented by  
 Mr. Murdoch, and while he was ad-  
 dressing the meeting Judge Worden  
 and others entered. Up to this time  
 nothing had been aimed direct to the  
 county court, but soon after Mr. Mur-  
 doch made charges direct. After  
 Mr. Pattee made his speech, Judge  
 Worden, without asking permission  
 to speak, brazenly held a meeting in  
 our hall, and discoursed for some-  
 thing over two hours. We have left  
 an awful path of destruction in Bon-  
 anza, Dairy and Langell Valley. Af-  
 ter the two hour talk it was late, and  
 consequently no debate could be had.  
 With the assurance we now have, we  
 last evening made plans for a broad  
 campaign, and will soon reach every  
 voter in Klamath county.

We are going to the expense of  
 typing more recall petitions, as the  
 ones we now have are full up. The  
 signers we have so far represent the  
 backbone of the precincts we have  
 partially canvassed.

We have made the charges; the  
 facts are conclusive; we have the  
 certified proof, and every citizen, be  
 he a capitalist or toiler believing in  
 the state law of referendum and re-  
 call, must either sign the petitions  
 for recall or call himself a traitor to  
 his legal rights.

The report in this morning's paper  
 stating that Mr. Murdoch was in Mer-  
 rill in the past few days is absolutely
